Subject: Community Health Division Monthly Activity Report – May 2026

I. OFFICE OF CHRONIC DISEASE PREVENTION & HEALTH PROMOTION (OCDPHP)

A. Chronic Disease Prevention Program (CDPP)

The annual **Slam Dunk Health Challenge** wrapped up in April. This year, 644 classrooms in 104 Clark County School District (CCSD) elementary schools, representing over 15,200 students, participated. The Slam Dunk Health Challenge is a model practice program between SNHD, OCDPHP, CCSD, and the Las Vegas Aces that encourages healthy eating and physical activity. Winning classes from each grade were recognized, and the Las Vegas Aces Mascot and In-Game Announcer visited the Grand Prize-winning classroom at Mendoza Elementary School in April.

The CDPP facilitated **three (3) in-person Diabetes Self-Management, Education & Support (DSMES)** classes in April. One (1) class was held at SNHD, and two (2) classes were held offsite at income-limited apartment complexes for seniors. Eighteen people attended at least one (1) class in April. Additionally, staff organized DSMES facilitator training for the new Health Educator in Health Equity.

Team CDPP organized the second annual **Heart of the Community Block Party** at Obodo Collective in April. An estimated 150 families attended, and 15 community partners participated to promote health and wellness through onsite dental screenings, eye exams, blood pressure screenings, and other resources to address social determinants of health and connect individuals to primary care services. On-site activities included heart-healthy food demos, line dancing, and activities for kids.

B. **Tobacco Control Program (TCP) Update**

TCP staff conducted educational outreach in twenty different CCSD High Schools, reaching over 28,000 students. The theme of the **BreakDown events was to Love Yourself and Live Vape-free**. During the outreach events, educational materials, fact sheets, and a short YouTube video were distributed and shared on social media.

SNHD staff partnered with the **Students Promoting Awareness, Responsibility & Knowledge (SPARK) Youth Advisory Council (YAC)** to host an outreach event at the College of Southern Nevada's West Charleston campus to educate students, faculty, and staff about the benefits of a tobacco-free campus. In addition to a large photo pledge display, members of the YAC answered questions, distributed educational materials, and collected policy support cards. The event generated multiple earned media stories.

Team TCP participated with Fiesta Radio 98.1 FM to promote tobacco-free living through the station's WhatsApp subscriber network and promoted the "**Vive Libre de Humo** (Live Smoke-Free)" movement. A custom message and graphic encouraging cessation were sent to the station's WhatsApp network of 2,500+ subscribers, inviting listeners to commit to a smoke-free lifestyle and to enroll through a direct sign-up link. Over ninety people joined the movement.

The Tobacco Control Coordinator was invited to participate and present at the **Native Hawaiian Pacific Islander Alliance (NHPIA) Strategic Planning Meeting** in April. During the meeting, the board adopted tobacco control and cessation as a pillar in their strategic plan. The NHPIA is a national organization that supports community-based organizations by working across sectors to advocate for the health and well-being of NHPs.

Our TCP staff cooperated in the statewide tobacco retailer census tract assessment project to map and analyze tobacco retailer density, marketing tactics, verify and count active tobacco retailer licenses, and educate tobacco retailers on current Nevada Tobacco 21 laws and ID verification practices. In April, the teams surveyed a total of twenty-six census tracts and completed assessments at 96 tobacco retailer outlets.

C. **OCDPHP Other Updates**

Two (2) organizations nominated by the Office of Chronic Disease Prevention & Health Promotion were selected as **Public Health Heroes**. The **Clark County School District Food Service Department** was nominated for its role in providing no-cost meals for all CCSD students, regardless of family income. **Nevada State University** was recognized for its Breathe with Ease Initiative and its work to implement a 100% tobacco and smoke-free campus policy and promote free cessation resources to all students, faculty, and staff. Both organizations were recognized for their efforts at the April SNHD Board of Health meeting.

- 1. The Senior Planner, Planner, and Clinical Advisor participated in the VAMC Earthquake exercise.
- 2. OPHP continues to support the City of Las Vegas with the provision of ICS 300/400/G191 training schedule. ICS 300 was provided on May 12th – 14th for 23 students at the City of Henderson EOC.
- 3. A CPR course and skills training were provided on May 13th for eight (8) staff and on May 20th for seven (7) staff at the SNHD Decatur location.
- 4. Our trainers provided New Hire Orientation at SNHD Decatur on May 20th for ten (10) new employees.
- 5. Trainer provided Radiation Nuclear Awareness/CRC training to 158 Environmental Health staff on May 20th via Teams.
- 6. The Senior Planner and PHP Technician attended Basic Academy Phase III (L0105 and L0146), completing the National Emergency Management Basic Academy.
- 7. Our Planner is continuing planning efforts for the 2027 Biological Functional Exercise. The midterm planning meeting is scheduled for August 26th. To enhance partner engagement, staff will deliver a presentation on the exercise at the June 4 SNHPC meeting.

- 2. Our Manager, Supervisor, and Planner are working with Desert Research Institute and other jurisdictional partners to conduct an Extreme Heat TTX scheduled for May 18th.

- 1. SNHPC held its monthly meeting. Supervisor, Senior Planners, and Planners attended.
- 2. OPHP Planners attended the Emergency Management Committee meetings for UMC.
- 3. MCI Surge Bags were distributed at the May 7th meeting.
- 4. Senior Planners, Planners, and Clinical Advisor updated the SNHPC COOP, Information Sharing Plan, Response Plan, and Resource Management Plan.

5. The Senior Planner, Planner, and Clinical Advisor began planning for the SNHPC August retreat – Extended Downtime Health Care Delivery Impact.
6. Our Clinical Advisor and Planners participated in the VA Full-Scale Evacuation exercise.

4. SNHPC members were provided radiological training opportunities by CTOS/NNSS for the week of June 15th – 19th.
5. OPHP staff observed NNSS's first Mass Casualty Transportation drill on May 6th at Mercury, NV.

D. PHP Technician and N-95 Fit Testing

1. Twenty SNHD Employees were FIT tested for personal protective equipment during May.

E. Fusion Center Public Health Analyst

Ongoing/Continuing Activities

1. Disseminated public health Information between SNHD and the Southern Nevada Counter Terrorism Center (SNCTC).
2. SNHD Analyst provided public health input for threat assessments on special events of local significance, including conventions and sports events.
3. Monthly, our analyst continues to provide weekly verbal public health briefings during the SNCTC collaboration meetings.
4. The OPHP analysts continue to participate in weekly Counter Terrorism Analytic Group (CTAG) meetings.
5. Aided law enforcement agencies during the investigation of biologicals in a residential area.
6. Our analyst continues to develop appropriate connections to increase communication between SNHD, SNCTC, and its partner organizations.
7. Collaborating with five (5) surrounding fusion centers on areas of public health concern for the production of monthly joint public health bulletins.
8. The OPHP Analyst contributes to a public health section of the Nevada Annual Threat Assessment.

F. Grants and Administration

Ongoing/Continuing Activities

1. The manager continues to monitor grant deliverables and budgets for FY 2026 with the State of Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health (DPBH).
2. Our manager continues to represent the Community Health Division management on various SNHD working group committees and initiatives.
3. The OPHP Manager continues to reduce the physical inventory of miscellaneous stockpiled preparedness resources and transfer of excess grant-purchased surplus property to community partners for use.
4. FY2027 scopes of work were completed and submitted to DPBH.

G. Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) of Southern Nevada

1. MRC Coordinator attended SNHPC meeting, planned training and activities for upcoming months, sent out newsletters, and continued to recruit and deactivate volunteers.
2. MRC Volunteers Nurse Volunteers provided BP check and distributed preparedness, chronic disease prevention, and health promotion materials, and clinic information at the UNLV Wellness Fair.
3. MRC hosted Stop the Bleed at SNHD for MRC and CERT volunteers (only MRC hours are counted in the table).

IV. VITAL RECORDS

- A. May is currently showing a **30% decrease in birth certificate** sales in comparison to May 2025. **Death certificate** sales are currently showing a **9%** decrease in comparison to May 2025. SNHD received revenues of \$25,818 for birth registrations, \$20,057 for death registrations, and an additional \$6,075 in miscellaneous fees.

V. HEALTH EQUITY

Health Equity Program – May Highlights

The Health Equity Program continues to strengthen community partnerships and collaborations aimed at increasing the capacity of local communities to address health disparities.

Key Activities in May:

1. Youth Advisory Council (YAC - SPARK)

- A. On May 12th, SNHD’s Youth Advisory Council SPARK (Students Promoting Awareness, Responsibility & Knowledge) marked completion of their tenure and responsibilities as Youth Advisory Council members with a graduation ceremony. During this event, Health Equity program staff highlighted YAC members’ professional and leadership development. YAC members reflected on their journey, experiences, expectations, and reported on the benefits associated with their participation in the program and group project.

VI. SOUTHERN NEVADA PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY (SNPHL)

A. Clinical Testing: Key Updates

1. SNHD Nursing Division Support

SNPHL provides laboratory services to the SNHD Nursing Division, including:

- a) Molecular and microbiological culture testing
- b) Sexually Transmitted Disease (STD) diagnostics

2. STD Surveillance and Testing

SNPHL collaborates with the SNHD STD Department in the following activities:

- a) Participation in the CDC’s Gonococcal Isolate Surveillance Project (GISP) and the enhanced GISP (eGISP).
- b) Performing NAAT (Nucleic Acid Amplification Test) and culture testing for *Neisseria gonorrhoeae* isolates, which are submitted to reference laboratories for antimicrobial susceptibility testing.
- c) Participation in eGISP Part B to expand culture-independent testing for antimicrobial resistance genes in gonococcal isolates.
- d) A detailed breakdown of monthly sample volumes provided on the accompanying table (RPR - Rapid Plasma Reagin):

3. COVID-19 Testing Operations

- a) SARS-CoV-2 PCR testing is performed exclusively on the KingFisher Flex platform.
- b) SNPHL maintains a testing capacity of 2,000 tests per day, with a turnaround time (TAT) of less than 48 hours.
- c) In May, the average daily testing volume was six (6) samples, with an average TAT of 48 hours from collection to report release.
- d) IT enhancements include streamlined patient accession and direct report verification from SNPHL’s Laboratory Information Management System (LIMS) into the SNHD patient portal.
- e) High-throughput automation has been incorporated, including the Eppendorf 5073 specimen fluid handling station.

B. Epidemiological Testing and Consultation - Key Updates:

1. Outbreak Investigation Committee Participation

SNPHL actively participates in the SNHD Outbreak Investigation Committee and the Foodborne Illness Taskforce. There were two (2) gastrointestinal (GI) outbreak samples received for investigation in May.

2. Influenza Surveillance Reporting

SNPHL continues to report influenza testing results to the CDC’s National Respiratory and Enteric Virus Surveillance System (NREVSS). In May, SNPHL performed 24 respiratory panel tests using the BioFire platform.

C. Emergency response and reportable disease isolate testing report - Key Activities and Capabilities:

1. Reportable Disease Isolate Testing and Confirmation

SNPHL performs reportable disease isolate testing and confirmation. Isolates submitted by local laboratories are serotyped and/or confirmed by Whole Genome Sequencing; stored on-site; and results reported and/or samples submitted to CDC through various national programs: Public Health Laboratory Information System (PHLIS), National Antimicrobial Resistance Monitoring System (NARMS), Influenza Surveillance, and PulseNet Bacterial Outbreak Surveillance.

2. Whole Genome Sequencing (WGS) Validation

SNPHL is clinically validated to use WGS for the identification of *Campylobacter* species (select species), pathogenic *Escherichia coli*, and *Salmonella* species. SNPHL is also

validated for the determination of *Salmonella* serotypes, STEC (Shiga toxin-producing *E. coli*) serotypes, and Shiga toxin genes.

3. PulseNet Surveillance

In May 2026, SNPHL performed 32 Whole Genome Sequencing tests (WGS) as part of the PulseNet Foodborne Outbreak Surveillance program.

4. Bacterial Isolate Screening

Using the Bruker MALDI-TOF instrument for streamlined screening of bacterial isolates. A total of 215 bacterial organisms were identified in May.

5. SARS-CoV-2 Sequencing

SNPHL is validated for the sequencing of SARS-CoV-2 and variants of concern through the identification of lineages and clades. SNPHL is sequencing 96 SARS-CoV-2-positive RNA extracts per week with expectations of increasing this capacity with appropriate staffing, instrumentation, and method development. As of May 2026, SNPHL has sequenced three (3) SARS-CoV-2-positive RNA extracts.

6. Legionella Surveillance

SNPHL collaborates with Environmental Health and Veritas Labs for Legionella surveillance. Monthly isolate counts for 2026 are as follows:

7. Vector-Borne Disease Testing

SNPHL provides viral testing for Zika, West Nile Virus (WNV), Western Equine Encephalitis, and Saint Louis Encephalitis.

- a) A total of 910 mosquito pool samples were tested in May.
- b) In May, no WNV-positive mosquito pool was identified.
- c) Results are communicated to Environmental Health and subsequently released to the public.

8. Gonococcal Isolation Surveillance Program (GISP/eGISP)

In May, SNPHL collected 13 clinical isolates:

- a) *Neisseria gonorrhoeae*: five (5) isolates
 - b) *Neisseria meningitidis*: zero (0) isolates
- These will be sent to regional labs or the CDC for antimicrobial susceptibility testing (AST). Remnant NAATs (NAAT - Nucleic Acid Amplification Test) or *N. gonorrhoeae* samples will be submitted to the CDC for molecular-based AST under eGISP Part B.

9. C. auris PCR Screening

SNPHL performed 1,708 Real-Time PCR screenings for *Candida auris* in May 2026.

D. **All-Hazards Preparedness:**

1. **Coordination with First Responder Training**

SNPHL collaborates on training and exercises with first responder agencies, including the Civil Support Team, HazMat units, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), and the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department.

2. **Laboratory Packaging and Shipping Guidance**

SNPHL offers guidance to local laboratorians on CDC protocols for packaging and shipping infectious substances, including chain of custody procedures.

3. **Onsite Training for Long-Term Care Facilities**

SNPHL provided onsite training for long-term care facilities on the use of COVID-19 online ordering applications.

4. **Monkeypox Biosafety Guidance**

Biosafety guidance was supplied to sentinel sites in response to Monkeypox surveillance and containment efforts.

5. **Vaccination Support for Laboratory Staff**

SNPHL facilitated Monkeypox and bivalent COVID-19 booster vaccinations for laboratory personnel.

6. **Ongoing Biosafety Training for SNPHL Staff**

The laboratory continues to provide perpetual biosafety training and updated guidance to SNPHL personnel.

7. **Ebola/High-Risk Pathogen Preparedness**

Ebola / High-Risk Pathogen Preparedness: Reviewed SNHD Ebola Virus Disease (EVD) plan, State Concept of Operations, and hospital/EMS Ebola protocols to support ongoing preparedness planning; materials are being used as a baseline for future response planning discussions.

E. **May 2026 SNPHL Activity Highlights:**

1. **COVID-19 Testing Supplies and Reagent Forecast**

SNPHL has maintained a consistent supply of Viral Transport Medium (VTM) for COVID-19 collection kits, even following the cessation of ELC COVID funding.

2. **Facility Infrastructure and Equipment Calibration**

The Phoenix Controls company came to resolve the IP address and test the integrated system adjustment for the installation of the on-site monitor computer and network connection on the 2nd floor. This enables facility staff and Sunbelt Control employees to manage and modify the airflow, pressure, and temperature; no additional updates were reported this month.

3. **Genomic Surveillance – SARS-CoV-2**

WGS and genomic data analysis indicate that the Omicron variant XFG lineages were domain lineages in May 2026, from the samples received in the laboratory. Our laboratory will keep sequencing the close contact samples to help ODS to follow up on the investigation.

4. **Influenza Surveillance**

The current influenza surveillance season showed that A/H3 and B/Victoria are major subtypes of influenza.

5. Avian Influenza Surveillance

SNPHL participates in the CDC’s Avian Influenza Surveillance Project by distributing testing guidance and specimen collection procedures to local hospitals via the Health Alert Network (HAN). Any ICU patients testing positive for Influenza A are required to submit specimens for subtyping to rule out avian influenza. No suspected avian flu samples were received in May.

6. Additional Test Items

The new additional test items for clinical chemistry, hematology, and urinalysis have formally opened the service for the FQHC and DPP division. The SNPHL website of the test menu has been updated and added the new tests.

7. Hospital Microbiology Laboratory Samples

Valley HS Core Microbiology Laboratory is the primary contributor to AFST, submitting an average of 46 samples per month, followed by Sunrise Hospital with approximately 34 samples per month. Additional smaller volumes are received from LabCorp, Quest Diagnostics Microbiology Department, and Horizon Specialty Hospital of Henderson.

8. Carbapenemase Gene Swabs

The SNPHL will use GeneXpert instrument to ID Carbapenemase genes from rectal swab samples. This project may be implemented after having the state CLIA inspection.

9. Expansion Planning: BSL-3 Equipment

SNPHL is collaborating with the SNHD facilities team to acquire laboratory equipment and IT accessories for the new laboratory building.
