Subject: Community Health Division Monthly Activity Report – July 2025

I. OFFICE OF CHRONIC DISEASE PREVENTION & HEALTH PROMOTION (OCDPHP)

A. Chronic Disease Prevention Program (CDPP)

The CDPP has been working with Together We Can, to support the **expansion of the Double Up Food Bucks (DUFB) program** in Southern Nevada. DUFB is a nutrition incentive program for people with SNAP benefits. CDPP partnered with the Obodo Collective to support the development of the **Obodo Green Grocer**, a small produce market which opened in February. In June, we were able to <u>launch the DUFB program at the Obodo Green Grocer</u>. Promotional materials were provided and a campaign to promote the program to the surrounding neighborhood is in development.

CDPP partnered with AAA Healthcare to offer a free **Diabetes Prevention Program** class to the community. The class was held at Nevada Partners and a graduation ceremony was held in June. Twenty people began the class and seven (7) completed the year-long course. <u>40% of the participants lost at least 5-7% of their weight</u>, which is a goal of the class as it significantly reduces the risk of developing type 2 diabetes. Our staff offered **one** (1) **Diabetes Self-Management**, **Education & Support (DSMES) class** in June. The class was provided in English and was an inperson class held at SNHD. <u>Sixteen people</u> participated in this particular class.

The 2025 <u>Move Your Way Summer</u> Initiative participated in three (3) events in June. The initiative promotes physical activity over the hot summer months by providing **free access to local pools and supporting aquatic activities for youth**. A sister initiative in the Hispanic community provides **educational materials and resources at community events**. In total, nearly 100 people

<u>participated in June events at the Rad Tad Pool Party, SCAN Central, and Pasaporte de la Nutricion</u>. The initiative will run through early September.

B. Tobacco Control Program (TCP) Update

<u>Culturally and linguistically competent educational and social branding materials aimed to prevent tobacco use initiation and promote quitting among priority populations were distributed to over **4,000** attendees at several community events in June including: Coffee and Conversations, Jazz in the Park concert, Juneteenth Celebration, and Black Music Appreciation Month Celebration.</u>

This month, information was shared through a social media package tailored for the Nevada Interscholastic Activities Association. Additionally, key youth identified in local high schools throughout Southern Nevada continued to share vaping prevention messaging on their social media accounts.

Staff met with Vice President of Resident Services and Senior Vice President of Property Management at Nevada HAND (Nevada HAND is a nonprofit organization that develops, builds, and manages affordable housing communities with supportive services for low-income individuals and families in Southern Nevada) to discuss smoke-free housing efforts. As a result, a partnership was re-established to promote smoke-free living across their communities. The partnership aims to empower residents with information and resources, reduce tobacco and vape use, support property managers in implementing smoke-free housing strategies, and improve overall community health outcomes. Engagement opportunities will continue throughout the year as part of this ongoing collaboration.

In June, twelve (12) local businesses (mainly restaurants) expanded their tobacco-free policy to include no smoking near entrances and exits.

II. OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES & TRAUMA SYSTEM (OEMSTS)

The OEMSTS plays a vital role in maintaining a responsive, well-trained, and integrated EMS and trauma system that serves the diverse needs of Southern Nevada's population.

SNHD received revenues of \$40,313 for birth registrations, \$24,089 for death registrations; and an additional \$9,106 in miscellaneous fees.

V. HEALTH EQUITY

Health Equity Program – July Highlights

The Health Equity Program continues to strengthen community partnerships and collaborations aimed at increasing the capacity of local communities to address health disparities.

Key Activities in July:

1. Community Outreach at Health & Wellness Fairs

The Health Equity team participated in seven (7) Health & Wellness Fairs hosted by Nevada HAND. During these events, the team provided attendees with information about services and resources available through the Southern Nevada Health District (SNHD).

2. Youth Advisory Board Council Launch

On July 30, the Health Equity team hosted an orientation meeting for the newly established pilot Youth Advisory Board Council. The council comprises ten (10) high school students from across the city, who will contribute their perspectives on public health issues while gaining knowledge and leadership skills in the field.

3. Participation in Youth Development Outreach

On July 31, the team engaged in the City of Las Vegas Youth Development & Social Initiatives' "Batteries Included" and "Batteries Included NextGen" community outreach event, furthering youth engagement in public health.

4. Community Convening on Dementia Risk Reduction

In collaboration with the Alzheimer's Association, the Health Equity Program hosted its first Community Convening Meeting on July 31. The meeting focused on reducing dementia risk and promoting healthy brain habits. It was attended by twenty-five (25) participants representing eight (8) community organizations.

VI. SOUTHERN NEVADA PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY (SNPHL)

A. Clinical Testing: Key Updates

1. SNHD Nursing Division Support

SNPHL provides laboratory services to the SNHD Nursing Division, including:

- a) Molecular and microbiological culture testing
- b) Sexually Transmitted Disease (STD) diagnostics

2. STD Surveillance and Testing

SNPHL collaborates with the SNHD STD Department in the following activities:

- a) Participation in the CDC's Gonococcal Isolate Surveillance Project (GISP) and the enhanced GISP (eGISP)
- b) Performing NAAT and culture testing for *Neisseria gonorrhoeae* isolates, which are submitted to reference laboratories for antimicrobial susceptibility testing
- c) Participation in eGISP Part B to expand culture-independent testing for antimicrobial resistance genes in gonococcal isolates
- d) A detailed breakdown of monthly sample volumes provided in the accompanying table:

3. COVID-19 Testing Operations

- a) SARS-CoV-2 PCR testing is performed exclusively on the KingFisher Flex platform
- b) SNPHL maintains a testing capacity of 2,000 tests per day, with a turnaround time (TAT) of less than 48 hours. In June, the average daily testing volume was 12 samples, with an average TAT of 45 hours from collection to report release
- c) IT enhancements include streamlined patient accession and direct report verification from SNPHL's Laboratory Information Management System (LIMS) into the SNHD patient portal
- d) High-throughput automation has been incorporated, including the Eppendorf 5073 specimen fluid handling station

- e) Due to unresolved scripting issues with the Tecan instrument, SNPHL has requested SNHD Contracts and Purchasing to explore the feasibility of returning the instrument to the manufacturer

B. **Epidemiological Testing and Consultation: Key Updates:**

1. Outbreak Investigation Committee Participation

SNPHL actively participates in the SNHD Outbreak Investigation Committee and the Foodborne Illness Taskforce. No gastrointestinal (GI) outbreak samples were received for investigation in July.

2. Influenza Surveillance Reporting

SNPHL continues to report influenza testing results to the CDC's National Respiratory and Enteric Virus Surveillance System (NREVSS). In June, no respiratory panel tests were performed using the BioFire platform.

C. <u>Emergency response and reportable disease isolate testing report:</u> Key Activities and Capabilities:

1. Reportable Disease Isolate Testing and Confirmation

SNPHL conducts testing and confirmation of reportable disease isolates submitted by local laboratories. These isolates are serotyped and/or confirmed via Whole Genome

Sequencing (WGS), stored on-site, and reported through national surveillance systems including:

- a) Public Health Laboratory Information System (PHLIS)
- b) National Antimicrobial Resistance Monitoring System (NARMS)
- c) Influenza Surveillance
- d) PulseNet Bacterial Outbreak Surveillance

2. Whole Genome Sequencing (WGS) Validation

SNPHL is clinically validated to use WGS for the identification of select *Campylobacter* species, pathogenic *Escherichia coli*, and *Salmonella* species. The lab is also validated for determining *Salmonella* serotypes, STEC (Shiga toxin-producing *E. coli*) serotypes, and Shiga toxin genes.

3. PulseNet Surveillance

In July 2025, SNPHL performed 33 WGS tests as part of the PulseNet Foodborne Outbreak Surveillance program.

4. Bacterial Isolate Screening

Using the Bruker MALDI-TOF instrument, SNPHL identified 145 bacterial organisms in July, streamlining the screening process for bacterial isolates.

5. SARS-CoV-2 Sequencing

SNPHL is validated for sequencing SARS-CoV-2 and variants of concern, including lineage and clade identification.

- a) Current capacity: up to 96 SARS-CoV-2-positive RNA extracts per week
- b) July 2025: 29 SARS-CoV-2-positive RNA extracts sequenced
- c) Capacity expansion is anticipated with additional staffing, instrumentation, and method development.

6. Legionella Surveillance

SNPHL collaborates with Environmental Health and Veritas Labs for Legionella surveillance. Monthly isolate counts for 2025 are as follows:

7. Vector-Borne Disease Testing

SNPHL provides viral testing for Zika, West Nile Virus (WNV), Western Equine Encephalitis, and Saint Louis Encephalitis.

- a) July 2025: 321 mosquito pool samples tested
- b) One (1) WNV-positive mosquito pool identified
- c) Results were communicated to Environmental Health and subsequently released to the public.

8. Gonococcal Isolation Surveillance Program (GISP/eGISP)

In July, SNPHL collected 23 clinical isolates:

a) Neisseria gonorrhoeae: 6 isolates

b) Neisseria meningitidis: 4 isolates

These will be sent to regional labs or the CDC for antimicrobial susceptibility testing (AST). Remnant NAATs or *N. gonorrhoeae* samples will be submitted to the CDC for molecular-based AST under eGISP Part B.

9. C. auris PCR Screening

SNPHL performed 1,250 Real-Time PCR screenings for Candida auris in July 2025.

D. <u>All-Hazards Preparedness:</u> Key Activities:

1. COVID-19 Emergency Response Testing Support

SNPHL supports testing efforts for the Southern Nevada Health District (SNHD) COVID-19 Emergency Incident Response, including outreach to local communities, CCDC jail-detention centers, institutions of higher education, and long-term care facilities. Rapid Antigen Point-of-Care (POC) testing platforms used include CDC-EUA approved systems: Abbott IDNow, Qiagen Sofia, and BD Veritor. Outbreak confirmation is supported through RT-PCR testing conducted by SNPHL.

2. Biosafety Training for Non-Traditional Testing Sites

SNPHL provides COVID-19 biosafety training and guidelines to non-traditional testing sites to ensure safe and effective testing practices.

3. Coordination with First Responder Training

SNPHL collaborates on training and exercises with first responder agencies including the Civil Support Team, HazMat units, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), and the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department.

4. Laboratory Packaging and Shipping Guidance

SNPHL offers guidance to local laboratorians on CDC protocols for packaging and shipping infectious substances, including chain of custody procedures.

5. Onsite Training for Long-Term Care Facilities

SNPHL provided onsite training for long-term care facilities on the use of COVID-19 online ordering applications.

6. Monkeypox Biosafety Guidance

Biosafety guidance was supplied to sentinel sites in response to Monkeypox surveillance and containment efforts.

7. Vaccination Support for Laboratory Staff

SNPHL facilitated Monkeypox and bivalent COVID-19 booster vaccinations for laboratory personnel.

8. Ongoing Biosafety Training for SNPHL Staff

The laboratory continues to provide perpetual biosafety training and updated guidance to SNPHL personnel.

9. Facility Equipment Upgrade

SNPHL received a double-door autoclave. Installation is pending completion of drywall extension and power connection by a local contractor.

E. July 2025 SNPHL Activity Highlights: Key Updates:

1. COVID-19 Testing Supplies and Reagent Forecast

SNPHL has maintained a consistent supply of Viral Transport Medium (VTM) for COVID-19 collection kits, even following the cessation of ELC COVID funding. However, reagents for PCR and Whole Genome Sequencing (WGS) are projected to be depleted by August 2025.

2. Proficiency Testing Performance

SNPHL achieved 100% proficiency across a wide range of tests, including:

- a) CAP SP-A Norovirus
- b) COV2-B SARS-CoV-2
- c) Mycoplasma genitalium
- d) HCV and HIV-B viral loads
- e) Clinical Chemistry
- f) Bordetella (BioFire)
- g) Shiga toxin and Enteric Pathogens
- h) Gram stain
- i) GC culture
- j) Trichomonas vaginalis
- k) BioFire respiratory virus panel

3. Facility Infrastructure and Equipment Calibration

Phoenix Controls completed system integration adjustments for new sensors and dampers installed by SunBelt and ATC, including recalibration of the biosafety cabinet (BSC) and chemical hood on the second floor.

4. BSL-3 Autoclave Installation

The installation of a new double-door autoclave in the BSL-3 laboratory has been finalized. The second inspection was successfully completed and passed state requirements on Friday, July 25.

5. Genomic Surveillance - SARS-CoV-2

WGS and genomic data analysis indicate that the Omicron variant XFG lineage was the dominant strain among samples received in July. SNPHL will continue sequencing close-contact samples to support ongoing investigations by the Office of Disease Surveillance (ODS).

6. Influenza Surveillance

Early data from the new influenza season show that A/H3, A/H1, and B/Victoria are the predominant subtypes.

7. Avian Influenza Surveillance

SNPHL participates in the CDC's Avian Influenza Surveillance Project by distributing testing guidance and specimen collection procedures to local hospitals via the Health Alert Network (HAN). ICU patients testing positive for Influenza A are required to submit specimens for subtyping to rule out avian influenza. No suspect avian flu samples were received in July.

8. Facility Expansion Planning

Phase I of the new facility design may focus on constructing BSL-3 and microbiology laboratories on the second floor, with a semi-shell layout planned for the first floor.

9. Expanded Clinical Testing Services
