RE: DIVISION OF CLINICAL SERVICES DIRECTOR REPORT

I. Immunization Program

A. Immunization Clinic Activities

1. A community flu program "The Impact of Influenza Disease and Effective Prevention Strategies" was presented by Dr. David Di John, Salomon Compaore and Douglas Banghart on October 13th at the Red Rock Conference Room. There were 42 attendees.
2. Three Immunization Clinic staff attended the Nevada Health Conference in Reno, NV October 17-18, 2016. The conference offered intensive sessions focusing on immunizations and preventative health for all ages and stages.
3. Hope World Wide immunization program provided 103 successful reminder recalls for children 19-35 months.

B. Immunization Outreach Activities

1. Immunization Clinics

- a. La Oportunidad Expo at Cashman Center (850 Las Vegas Boulevard Las Vegas, NV 89101) on October 1, 2016 provided 142 vaccinations for 63 clients.
- b. National Night Out Event (3750 E. Cecile Avenue Las Vegas, NV 89115) on October 4, 2016 provided 11 vaccinations for 7 clients.
- c. La Familia Medical Center (2465 Reynolds Avenue Las Vegas, NV 89030) on October 20, 2016 provided 88 vaccinations for 28 clients.
- d. Westcare Women's and Children (5659 W. Duncan Las Vegas, NV 89130) on October 21, 2016 provided flu vaccinations for 10 clients.
- e. Centers for Behavioral Health (3050 E. Desert Inn Las Vegas, NV 89121) on October 27, 2016 provided 30 vaccinations for 9 clients.
- f. The Center (LGBTQ) (401 S. Maryland Parkway Las Vegas, NV 89101) on Mondays and Wednesdays provided 130 vaccinations for 71 clients.

II. Maternal Child Health Nursing Program

A. Child Care Health Consultation (CCHC)

1. One class provided to a local child care facility by the Child Care Health Consultant.
2. No new elevated lead case referrals were received during month.

B. Nurse Family Partnership (NFP)

1. The NFP program has 124 active clients. Forty-eight clients are participating through the Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program (MIECV) made available through the NV Division of Public and Behavioral Health under the Affordable Care Act.
2. Two nurse home visitors were hired and began their employment with the SNHD this month. The new hires are completing orientation and beginning the training in the program. The program now has 7 nurse home visitors.

C. Healthy Start Initiative (HSI)

1. The HSI has enrolled 273 at risk participants since March 2015. Sixty-nine infants have been born into the program. Two case managers and one team lead are serving 158 active participants. The HSI program hired and began training of a new Nurse Case Manager.
2. HSI team members completed a Marijuana use in-service conducted by the PACT Coalition. The team continues ongoing activities to support families in meeting project goals to improve women's health, increase access to quality services, strengthen families' resilience, achieve collective impact and monitor performance/outcomes.
3. The Family Community Action Network (FamCAN) convened their quarterly meeting where 3 shared goals were identified for guiding future activities. FamCan partnered with the Black Nurses Association to host a Brain Health Workshop that provided education and resources for care givers of persons diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease or dementia.
4. The HSI program partnered with Safe Nest in coordinating an awareness initiative for Domestic Violence (DV). Activities about DV included a social media kit with video, posters and collective photo with Community Health Nursing staff wearing purple pins.
5. Outreach efforts included interviews for a temporary outreach position who will support efforts to make new referral partnerships and fortify existing partners for the HSI program.

D. HIV Intensive Medical Case Management (IMCM)

1. The HIV-IMCM program served 101 clients this month. Three pregnant women were referred to the program and five babies were born with perinatal HIV exposure. Newborns and infants are followed in case management for periodic HIV testing until cleared at approximately four months of age.
2. The Nevada State Office of HIV/AIDS –Bureau of Behavior Health, Wellness and Prevention Program conducted the Ryan White Part B fiscal and programmatic site visits this month as required by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA). Site visit report will be available at the end of November 2016.

III. Sexual Health Clinic (SHC) (HIV and STD Care Services)

- A. The entire SHC staff received training on Human Trafficking awareness, presented by Rachell Ekroos, Chief Administrative Nurse.
- B. The SHC Lab Assistant, Tabitha Ewing, assisted the Office of Disease Surveillance staff with a successful weekend screening outreach at the Las Vegas Pride Parade.
- C. SHC began discussion with the Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program to participate in their planned teen health access day set to occur in early November.
- D. The transition of Lourdes Yapjoco into the position of the Ryan White A & B Clinical Services Supervisor began on October 24, 2016.

IV. Tuberculosis Clinic/Refugee Health Program

- A. Three new active adult cases and one pediatric case were reported to the TB Clinic.
- B. The Refugee Health Program served 62 clients with seventeen clients (27%) requiring communicable disease follow-up.

V. Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP)

- A. The TPP program and grant partners continued to initiate and provide programmatic activities at the Juvenile Justice System, Department of Family Services, and other community based organizations in the community.
- B. Special Projects, Reports/Events: TPP staff held outreach activities at Canyon Springs High School, Cheyenne High School, Las Vegas High School, Rancho High School, Sunrise High School and the LGBT Pride Festival and skate night event. Through these outreach activities, TPP reached 883 youth.
- C. During October, through the TPP program's social media campaign the THNKnevada Facebook page reached a total of 6,155 likes and 31,704 individuals were engaged in it. The twitter account reached 611 followers and had 3,086 impressions. The THINK website had 322 users and the Instagram page reached 519 followers and 75 youth were engaged.

Family Planning (FP)

- D. FP Program services at East Las Vegas and Decatur Public Health Centers served a total of 616 clients; of which 590 were unduplicated representing a 3% increase from FY 2015-2016.
 - 1. The East Las Vegas family planning clinic served 416 clients (401 unduplicated clients).
 - 2. The Decatur family planning clinic served 200 clients (189 unduplicated clients).

VI. Clinical Services Administration

- 1. Nevada State College nursing students and 1 medical resident completed SNHD rotations.
