



#### What We Know: Drug Overdose

 Most fatal drug overdoses are unintentional

OVERDOSE DATA TO ACTION The *preliminary* rate of fatal unintentional overdose in
 2020 was higher than the
 peak in 2011 (21.2 vs 19.2 per 100,000)





#### Unintentional overdose deaths among Clark County residents by drug class (1999-2020\*)








#### What is fentanyl?

Fentanyl is a highly potent synthetic opioid in two forms:

Lethal dose for heroin and fentanyl



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- Pharmaceutical use
- Illicitly manufactured:
  - Mixed into drugs
  - Pressed into counterfeit pills

#### **Emerging issue: Younger Adults**

2020\* fentanyl overdoses – Median age:

- 49 years Non-fentanyl
- 29 years Fentanyl

#### **Emerging issue: Drug contamination**

Other drugs implicated in fentanyl overdoses (2020):

Drug Class	% of Deaths
Benzodiazepines	31%
Psychostimulants	25%
Natural/Semi-Synthetic Opioids	23%
Cocaine	20%
Heroin	2%

Increased need for polysubstance use focus in community response


- Recognition of substance use as a chronic health condition that is:

  - <u>NOT</u> a moral failure or criminal behavior



#### 2. Safer Prescribing

SNHD promotes statewide efforts to expand the Nevada Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (NV-PMP):

- NV-PMP is housed at the Board of Pharmacy
- Integration into:
  - any Electronic Health Records
  - OpenBeds





### 2. Safer Prescribing


Recommendations:

1. Promote education for prescribers on the prescription drug monitoring program's role in ending opioid epidemic

2. Discuss importance of Medicaid and other insurance systems paying for longer treatment

#### Recommendations:


- 1.Promote stigma trainings
- 2. Use first person language
- 3. Remove barriers to care for people who use drugs

#### 4. Harm Reduction

SNHD's Office of Emergency Medical Services and Trauma System provides naloxone to first responders in Southern Nevada

#### 4. Harm Reduction

OVERDOSE DATA TO ACTION

#### Recommendations:

- 1. Support state funding for syringe services programs
- 2. Encourage wide distribution of naloxone
- 3. Explore overdose prevention sites in Southern NV

#### 5. Treatment Expansion

OVERDOSE DATA TO ACTION

#### **Recommendations:**

- 1. Encourage all prescribers to become certified to prescribe bupren orphine
- 2. Support long-term recovery options for Nevada Medicaid
  - 3. Support "treatment on demand" based models

# 6. Criminal Justice Reform

SNHD's Linkage to Action (L2A) team works in CCDC and overdose "hot spots" to connect people vulnerable to overdose to needed services

OVERDOSE DATA TO ACTION





LVMPD's Law enforcement Interventions for Mental health and Addiction (LIMA) diverts low-level, non-violent offenders to mental health treatment and substance use services within the community

#### 6. Criminal Justice Reform

#### OVERDOSE DATA TO ACTION

#### Recommendations:

- 1. Support diversion efforts across all justice systems
- 2. Support changes in street-level policing to encourage officers to divert
- 3. Long-term funding for L2A programs that promote access to treatment/ harm reduction in justice-involved populations

## 7. Regulatory Changes

# The future!

#### **Recommendation:**

Support any opportunity to review & revise laws in favor of treating substance use disorder like any other behavioral health disorder such as:

- deregulation of medication assisted treatment at the federal level
- greater access to medications for addiction treatment

- Service delivery
- Staff response
- The drug supply x fentanyl
- Isolation & financial hardship


OVERDOSE DATA TO ACTION
