I. CALL TO ORDER and ROLL CALL

The Chair called the Southern Nevada District Board of Health Meeting to order at 9:02 a.m. Andria Cordovez Mulet, Executive Assistant, administered the roll call and confirmed quorum.

II. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The Chair acknowledged attendees present in relation to the proposed septic system regulations, expressing appreciation for their engagement. The Chair apologized for the posting error in the online agenda, which incorrectly indicated that septic system regulations would be discussed during the meeting. It was clarified that while this topic was not on the current agenda, the Health District recognized the importance of community input. In response to feedback received last month, public workshops would be scheduled in the new year to facilitate robust discussions; details on the workshop will be shared through various communications, including postcard mailers, to ensure broad awareness and participation. The goal was to balance public health priorities with homeowner concerns. Attendees were invited to share comments during the Second Public Comment period.

The Chair recognized Dr. Erick Lopez, Dr. Anil Mangla, Rebecca Topol, and Lei Zhang for co-authoring the published article "Examining Disparities in COVID-19 Hospitalization Outcomes in Southern Nevada by Vaccination Status" in the Nevada Journal of Public Health. The study examined predictors of COVID-19 outcomes by race and ethnicity, vaccination status, age, sex, marital status, and insurance payer status among COVID-19 patients who were admitted to a hospital. The study concluded that work is needed to identify and address barriers to vaccine uptake in communities with high social vulnerability. On behalf of the Southern Nevada Health District and the Board of Health, the Chair congratulated staff on this publication.

Ms. Johnson confirmed that St. Rose Siena complied with regulations, was in good standing with the Health District, and continued to provide all the requirements based on its designation. Ms. Johnson further advised that staff recommended that the Board of Health approve the renewal application.

The Chair opened for Public Comment. Seeing no one, the Chair closed the period for Public Comment.

A motion was made by Member Kirkpatrick, seconded by Member Nemec, and carried unanimously to approve the Renewal of Authorization of St. Rose Siena Hospital as a Level III Trauma Center, as presented.

Ms. Johnson presented the Renewal of Authorization of Sunrise as a Level II Trauma Center. Ms. Johnson confirmed that Sunrise Hospital & Medical Center complied with regulations, was in good standing with the Health District, and continued to provide all the requirements based on its designation. Ms. Johnson further advised that staff recommended that the Board of Health approve the renewal application.

The Chair opened for Public Comment. Seeing no one, the Chair closed the period for Public Comment.

A motion was made by Member Kirkpatrick, seconded by Member Brune, and carried unanimously to approve the Renewal of Authorization of Sunrise Hospital & Medical Center as a Level II Trauma Center, as presented.

VIII. REPORT / DISCUSSION / ACTION

1. Approval of the 2026 Board of Health Meeting Schedule; direct staff accordingly or take other action as deemed necessary *(for possible action)*

The Board was advised that the proposed 2026 meeting schedule followed the timeline approved by the Board in previous years, noting that the meeting in November is a week early and was adjusted to 11:00 a.m., a few years ago, to accommodate those members with conflicting public agency meetings.

A motion was made by Member Nielson, seconded by Member Kirkpatrick, and carried unanimously to approve the 2026 Board of Health Meeting Schedule, as presented.

IX. BOARD REPORTS: The Southern Nevada District Board of Health members may identify and comment on Health District related issues. Comments made by individual Board members during

this portion of the agenda will not be acted upon by the Southern Nevada District Board of Health unless that subject is on the agenda and scheduled for action. (*Information Only*)

Member Kirkpatrick referenced a recent discussion held by the Board of Clark County Commissioners (BCC) concerning mosquito abatement initiatives. She emphasized the importance of the Health District being involved in these conversations. Member Kirkpatrick suggested redistributing the "Fight the Bite" flyer to the Board to support public awareness efforts. Further, she noted that the County was actively exploring the feasibility and associated costs of implementing a mosquito abatement program. A key consideration identified was the necessity of accessing private properties, as these areas are commonly where mosquito populations thrive. Dr. Lockett advised that staff observed the BCC meeting and confirmed that the Health District was committed to working Clark County and other agencies on this initiative.

X. HEALTH OFFICER & STAFF REPORTS (Information Only)

• DHO Comments

In addition to the written report, Dr. Lockett advised

Dr. Lockett provided an update on a confirmed measles case involving an out-of-state visitor who passed through Terminal 3, E Gates at Harry Reid International Airport on the morning of October 13. The individual did not visit other locations in Clark County, and no additional details were available while the investigation continued. Dr. Lockett reiterated that measles has a 7-to-21-day incubation period, with symptoms including fever, cough, runny nose, red or watery eyes, followed by a rash that would begin on the face and spread to the body. Dr. Lockett also described the rash progression from flat red macules to eventually becoming scabs as the rash resolves. The virus was highly contagious, remained airborne for up to two hours. Dr. Lockett advised that individuals present at the affected terminal should verify their immunization status and contact healthcare providers if symptoms developed.

Dr. Lockett further advised that nationally, as of October 21, there have been 1,618 confirmed measles cases across 42 states, with 43 outbreaks reported in 2025 and 87% of all cases are outbreak-associated. Dr. Lockett also noted that in 2024 only 16 outbreaks were reported and 69% of all cases were outbreak associated. Dr. Lockett confirmed that Clark County had not had a resident case since 2018. Dr. Lockett emphasized the importance of vaccination, noting that two doses of the MMR vaccine were 97% effective. Member Kirkpatrick requested a fact sheet on measles to share with staff at Harry Reid International Airport.

Vaccine Update

Dr. Rosanne Sugay, Medical Epidemiologist, provided an overview of the annual approval and distribution for seasonal viral respiratory immunizations. Further, Dr. Sugay outlined this year's approval and distribution for the COVID-19 vaccine and explained the impact of the delayed recommendations from the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP).

Shannon Pickering, Community Health Nurse Manager, presented data for the last five years, for September and October, on COVID-19, flu, and respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) vaccinations at the Health District clinics. Ms. Pickering advised there was a delay in receiving the state-funded vaccines under the Vaccines for Children (VFC) Program and the Section 317 Program.

Member Bond inquired whether there had been a change in public funding for vaccines. Ms. Pickering advised that while there was a brief delay, state-funded vaccines were made available quickly, and all eligible clients were contacted and vaccinated as soon as possible.

Dr. Robin Carter, Chief Medical Officer and Medical Director for the FQHC, detailed the implementation of a Standing Order for COVID-19 vaccination at the Health District, designed to reduce barriers and allow Health District nurses to administer vaccines without a clinician's prescription, and clarified the alignment with professional academy recommendations.

Further to an inquiry from Member Nemec, Dr. Carter advised that the Standing Order was based on the academies and not the CDC specifically, as the CDC specifically referenced individual decision-making requirements. The Standing Order does not make individual decision-making a requirement for the sell vaccines, however, was required for the federally funded vaccines which include Vaccine for Children (VFC) and 317 for adults who are uninsured or underinsured.

Member Kirkpatrick noted an increased number of closures in restaurants in certain areas and suggested that staff determine whether educational workshops would be beneficial to assist restaurants to maintain compliance.

XII. SECOND PUBLIC COMMENT: A period devoted to comments by the general public, if any, and discussion of those comments, about matters relevant to the Board's jurisdiction will be held. Comments will be limited to five (5) minutes per speaker. If any member of the Board wishes to extend the length of a presentation, this may be done by the Chair or the Board by majority vote.

Carol Reynolds expressed concerns about how residents have been affected by the water authority's malicious water pricing and excessive use fees. Ms. Reynolds highlighted stories from residents struggling with punitive water pricing, including restricted showering, flushing toilets, and using a dishwasher. Ms. Reynolds noted the excessive funds spent on maintaining the landscaping of their properties, which was now deteriorating. She noted the replacement of natural grass athletic fields with artificial turf, citing health risks, especially for children. Ms. Reynolds noted that the NFL has encouraged the use of natural grass fields for player safety. Reynolds argued that the health department should hold water authorities accountable for endangering the health of residents. Ms. Reynolds stated that the septic issue was a diversion tactic by the water authority to finance unlimited growth.

Laura McSwain spoke on behalf of the Water Fairness Coalition, which advocates against punitive water policies affecting long-term residents. She raised concerns about proposed septic

system regulation changes, emphasizing their financial and environmental impacts. Ms. McSwain criticized the lack of transparency in the rulemaking process, indicating the exclusion of direct resident notification. She questioned the fairness of converting lifetime septic permits into five-year reviews, citing examples of residents facing significant costs and delays due to septic-related permit issues. Ms. McSwain also noted inconsistencies in the stated purpose of the regulations and called for improved public access to meeting materials and schedules. She urged the board to prioritize existing residents' quality of life and reconsider the proposed regulations.

Diane Henry thanked the board for pausing the proposed septic regulations and expressed concern that the changes were driven by water reclamation goals rather than public health and safety. She referenced AB220, promoted by SNWA in 2023, noting that many mandates now appearing in the proposed regulations—such as five-year permit reviews and mandatory sewer connections—were rejected by the legislature. Ms. Henry emphasized that converting lifetime septic permits into revocable ones was an unfair burden on septic owners. She stated that vague statements about rising nitrate levels did not constitute a public health crisis. Ms. Hendry urged the Board not to impose new regulations for moral, ethical, and legal reasons.

Edwin Kaehler expressed full agreement with the preceding speaker's position. He stated that the existing 2009 septic system regulations were adequate and did not require revision. He advocated for the continued recognition of lifetime septic permits, emphasizing that such permits should remain valid without mandatory renewal. Mr. Kahler drew a comparison between septic permit renewals and vehicle smog checks, noting that while the vehicle inspection process was standardized and objective, the criteria for septic system evaluations were vague and inconsistent. He highlighted the lack of clear guidelines regarding acceptable levels of tank debris, structural imperfections, and minor leaks, arguing that the ambiguity leads to subjective and potentially unfair assessments. He further asserted that property owners were inherently motivated to address septic system failures due to the immediate and unpleasant consequences, such as odors or sewage surfacing. Mr. Kahler noted that the porous soil naturally contained bacteria that took care of itself.

Yvette Williams, a resident of Spring Valley, expressed concern regarding the financial and logistical challenges of converting properties with existing septic systems to sewer connections. She noted that her property contained two septic tanks, with one requiring an estimated \$50,000-\$100,000 for connection, and the other, serving a guest house, requiring nearly \$250,000 due to elevation and distance issues. She emphasized that many residents in older communities face similar burdens due to cul-de-sac layouts and long distances from sewer lines. Ms. Williams advocated for grandfathering existing systems and applying new regulations only to future developments. She highlighted the personal impact, stating that such mandates could force her to sell her home of nearly 30 years and potentially leave Nevada due to rising costs and lack of consideration for multi-generational households. Ms. Williams also referenced legislative intent, asserting that prior laws were enacted to protect residents from such hardships, and that current proposals appear misaligned with that intent. She criticized past planning decisions that approved septic systems to facilitate rapid growth in Clark County without adequate infrastructure, and expressed frustration that residents are now bearing the consequences. Finally, she raised environmental concerns, pointing to recent approvals for large-scale underground tunneling projects by private companies, which she claimed pose risks to groundwater and have incurred numerous violations with minimal penalties. She questioned the fairness of imposing strict regulations on residents while businesses receive lenient treatment.

My name is Christian Salmon, S-A-L-M-O-N, Clark County homeowner. Under NRS 241.035 I respectfully request that my comments today be entered verbatim into the public record. I own two septic systems and I believe the concerns I'm sharing today reflect many septic owners across Clark County and feel who also feel they would want to be expressed if they were here. This meeting is during the day and it's hard for many to come. Thank you for allowing me to speak. I'm here to address the proposed 2025 regulations governing individual sewage disposal systems and liquid waste management. If adopted, these rules would permanently change how families like mine live, maintain their property, and even sell their homes. These regulations redefine simple maintenance as full construction. If a pump or lid fails, a homeowner could suddenly be required to obtain a full engineering permit, pay for multiple inspections and even reconstruct their entire system. That's a major change for the from the practical proven methods that have been working safely for decades. The proposal also adds five-year operation per operation operating permits that expire automatically when properties transfer. That means no valid permit, no sale, turning home ownership into a revolving cycle of fees, paperwork and inspections that never ends although the spec specific impacts may differ. For those on the Colorado River water, private wells and rural versus city parcels every group is being drawn into the same web of new regulation. Each each of us faces different challenges under this proposal. Yet we are all united in one belief that these rules go too far, too fast, and must be rejected in their entirety, just as this regulation was introduced as one comprehensive package, it should be rejected as a whole so that all property owners, regardless of location, water source and circumstance, can equally be protected. We all share one goal to maintain our property rights, preserve our independence, and ensure that every homeowner in Clark County is treated fairly and consistently in liberty. Before rewriting long standing policy, we need to ask the most basic question - Is there a health emergency? No such emergency has ever been declared by SNHD, NDEP, or any other state or federal agency. If there is if there is a public health emergency, where is the study supporting it? The District's own flyer admits that there are no documented specific failure rates or public health studies that justify these sweeping mandates and the emergency truly if the emergency truly existed Nevada law requires the public to be notified. Yet there was no notice, no press release and no outreach. It is understandable then that the citizenry is skeptical of this process. There's 18,245 of us that were notified only at the bare minimum required by law. Only after word spread among septic owners did a postcard arrive, one that contained no substantive information, collected no contact details and promised no future communications, you know, i.e. e-mail. Why? That does not inspire trust. It deepens the divide between government and the people it serves. So some of us remember the early days of AB220, which contained language that criminalized ordinary homeowners for being on a septic system. Those punitive provisions were later removed, thank goodness. Yet the 2025 proposal seems to resurrect that same idea back under a new form of enforcement. Can you imagine law abiding families being treated like criminals simply for having their homes built and permitted decades ago? We don't deserve to be criminalized for having a septic system, do we? This proposal creates a regulatory trap that tightens over time. One permit, one inspection, and one new fee at a time until independence gives way to permanent oversight. You'd be the PUCN effectively, and I'd be the regulated utility. That's not environmental progress, that's overreach. The true goal is protecting water. If the true goal is protecting water, then that then let's pursue the opportunities that will actually make a difference. Nevada currently receives about .85% of the total Colorado River pact allotment, the smallest of any basin state. Instead of targeting homeowners or a or agencies that should be renegotiating their higher allotment and requiring other basin states to recycle their wastewater to the same standard we already achieve. Coastal states like California have the ocean at their doorstep and the ability to desalinate water. They should have been doing this before Nevadans are told to dig up their yards. One last thing is abandon your regulations, not my septic. Thank you.

Ann Casey, a lifelong Las Vegas resident, shared her experience attempting to connect her property to the city sewer system following the introduction of AB220. She expressed willingness to convert from septic but encountered significant challenges, including lack of clear guidance from local agencies, poor communication, and difficulty obtaining contractor bids. Despite extensive efforts, she was only able to secure one incomplete bid, estimated at \$40,000, with actual costs likely closer to \$50,000 when accounting for connection fees, landscaping, and inflation. She emphasized that her neighborhood contains numerous septic systems and that even properties close to sewer lines face prohibitive costs. Ms. Casey argued that the financial burden placed on homeowners, potentially totaling over \$1 billion across affected properties, is unjustified, especially in the absence of demonstrated public benefit or due process. She noted that the Water Reclamation District targets only problematic systems for conversion funding, excluding her property. Ms. Casey concluded by urging decision-makers to consider the lack of contractor availability, the absence of clear problem identification, and the disproportionate impact on homeowners. She questioned the fairness of imposing costly mandates on residents.

The Chair asked Ms. Casey to leave her address with staff.

Robert Thornley, a resident of the rural preservation area, expressed strong opposition to the proposed changes regarding septic system usage. Drawing on his experience as a general contractor and former chairman of the Nevada State Public Works Board, he voiced concerns about increasing utility-related costs and regulatory burdens. He described multiple financial investments made to maintain independence from municipal utilities, including purchasing water rights and installing solar panels. He criticized recent policy shifts that threaten to revoke unused water rights and reduce solar energy credits, viewing these actions as part of a broader effort to diminish homeowner autonomy. Mr. Thornley argued that the Health District's proposed septic regulations would unnecessarily expand government oversight and impose costly inspections without clear justification. He emphasized that septic system issues are typically self-evident and regularly addressed by homeowners. He further questioned the environmental rationale behind the regulations, noting that septic systems represent a small fraction of water usage in Clark County. He cited the significant costs of sewer conversion, ranging from \$40,000 to several hundred thousand dollars, and warned of property devaluation and financial hardship for retirees like himself. Mr. Thornley concluded by urging officials to focus on managing Las Vegas's rapid growth rather than imposing burdensome regulations on long-standing residents.

Rick Aco, a realtor serving Clark, Lincoln, and Nye counties, expressed opposition to proposed changes requiring new five-year septic permits, inspections, and water tests. He noted that homeowners already paid for permits and inspections when their homes were built, and that residential purchase agreements allow buyers to request septic and well inspections, with costs negotiated between parties. He emphasized that this existing process is effective without additional government oversight. As a homeowner in Sandy Valley, Mr. Aco highlighted the impracticality of sewer conversion in rural areas due to lack of infrastructure, funding, and accessibility. He stated that mandatory inspections would increase costs and delays, particularly in remote communities. He also noted that the proposed changes are already negatively impacting real estate transactions by adding complexity and discouraging buyers. Mr. Aco concluded by urging the Board not to duplicate existing processes, not to impose urban regulations on rural communities, and to prioritize fairness over bureaucracy.

Denise Tropea-Kelly, a resident of Centennial for 25 years, expressed strong opposition to the proposed 2025 septic regulations. She stated that her community has responsibly maintained its

wells and septic systems and that the new rules would impose unreasonable and unaffordable burdens on rural homeowners. Specifically, she noted that minor repairs could trigger full system redesigns, driving up costs and threatening long-standing, safe living conditions. She referenced existing Nevada statutes (NRS 444.650 and NRS 534) as sufficient for public protection and argued that there is no data indicating widespread septic system failure or environmental harm. Ms. Tropea-Kelly emphasized that rural residents are conscientious about system maintenance and that the proposed regulations disproportionately affect lower-income households and those who have invested significant personal labor into their homes. She concluded by urging the Board to protect homeowner rights, reject unnecessary regulations, and allow responsible rural residents to continue managing their land and water independently. She advocated for grandfathering existing systems.

Karen Walker, a resident of the rural preservation area since 2007, expressed opposition to the proposed 2025 septic regulations. She stated that her custom-built home complies with all existing laws and that her private septic and well systems represent a significant portion of her mortgage, which she is still paying. She emphasized that requiring abandonment of these systems would impose unfair financial burdens on homeowners still servicing loans for infrastructure they would no longer be allowed to use. Ms. Walker noted that her septic system is located approximately 10 feet underground, which she had to drill to a depth of 700 feet, making contamination unlikely. She argued that there is no documented evidence of groundwater danger in her area and that the proposed regulations lack justification for targeting functioning systems. She urged the Board to revise the regulations to focus on areas without future access to public sewer infrastructure, such as Mount Charleston and Lee Canyon, and to avoid placing the cost of implementing AB220 on homeowners with healthy systems.

Roy Trafton expressed support for the concerns raised by fellow residents regarding the proposed septic regulations. He noted that he did not receive proper notice about the meeting and emphasized that many others in the community are similarly unaware of the potential impacts. He stated that existing septic systems are functioning safely and questioned the necessity of five-year inspection requirements, particularly for single-occupant households like his. Mr. Tropton criticized the disproportionate burden placed on homeowners, especially retirees, who may face significant financial hardship due to mandated conversions and inspections. He highlighted broader concerns about unchecked development, water consumption by data centers, and the lack of corresponding infrastructure expansion. He urged the Board to consider grandfathering in existing systems. Mr. Tropton concluded by calling for greater clarity.

The Chair suggested that any members of the public leave their address with staff to confirm that they are on the mailing list.

David Croteau expressed strong opposition to the proposed septic regulations, citing the significant financial investment in his property, including \$900,000 tied to his home and \$100,000 in landscaping. He stated that mandated changes would result in the destruction of his front yard and impose unfair costs on homeowners. He questioned the legislative process behind the proposal, asking who initiated it and which lawmakers supported it. Mr. Croteau emphasized that the community does not support these changes and that the burden should not fall on residents. He urged the Board to reconsider the regulations and protect homeowners from unnecessary financial hardship.

Judy Heath, a resident of the Children's Memorial Park area in unincorporated Clark County, expressed concern over the lack of public awareness regarding the proposed septic regulations.

She noted that many of her neighbors, particularly elderly residents, were unaware of the issue due to limited access to digital communication. She and her husband distributed flyers to inform the community. Ms. Heath described the emotional and financial stress the proposed changes are causing, particularly for vulnerable residents. She shared an example of a neighbor who fears becoming homeless due to the potential costs. She also highlighted the impact on animals in the area and the disruption that septic system alterations could cause. She raised concerns about the high cost of septic conversion, citing a neighbor's quote of \$100,000 for a single property. Ms. Heath questioned the need to notify the Health District when selling a home and emphasized that residents with septic systems are often more cautious about waste disposal than those on sewer systems. Ms. Heath concluded by urging the Board to abandon the proposed regulations, emphasizing that they disproportionately affect elderly and low-income residents in rural areas.

Robert Dreyfus, a rural homeowner in Moapa, expressed strong opposition to the proposed 2025 Individual Sewage Disposal System (ISDS) regulations. He raised concerns regarding their constitutionality, lack of supporting evidence, financial impact, and due process. He cited the Nevada Supreme Court's ruling requiring a two-thirds legislative majority for recurring fees, such as the proposed \$226 charge, and argued that implementing such fees through rulemaking may violate Article 4 of the Nevada Constitution and the 5th Amendment. He noted the absence of data on septic system failure rates, groundwater contamination, or cost-benefit analysis, asserting that the regulations appear arbitrary and may infringe upon the 14th Amendment due process protections. Mr. Dreyfus also highlighted the financial burden on rural and fixed-income homeowners, referencing potential costs of up to \$100,000 for system upgrades and the risk of property devaluation. He criticized the notification process as inadequate, referencing the short three-week window between learning of the proposal and the scheduled hearing, which limited community input. Mr. Dreyfus recommended postponing implementation, conducting independent studies, considering grandfathering provisions and waivers, providing financial aid for low-income residents, and improving public outreach. He concluded by urging the Board to reject the regulations in their current form to ensure legal compliance and protect homeowner rights.

Lisa Scaro (?sp), a resident of Section 11 at 6245 Edna Ave, attended the meeting after being informed by neighbors and expressed appreciation for community engagement. She identified herself as a real estate broker and voiced agreement with concerns previously raised by another realtor from Sandy Valley. Ms. Scaro (?sp) emphasized the financial burden associated with sewer connection, citing a past estimate of \$55,000 for trenching alone, excluding additional costs such as connection fees and landscaping. She advocated for greater transparency and accountability, expressing this should not be in the purview of the Health District. Ms. Scaro (?sp) highlighted ongoing issues with short-term rentals in her neighborhood, including improper pool water disposal, excessive trash, and unregulated business activities posing health and safety risks. She requested clarification regarding discussions held in a prior meeting about short-term rentals and stressed the importance of protecting responsible homeowners from undue burdens.

Hardy Brunell, a long-time resident of over 40 years, expressed concerns regarding the financial burden of connecting to the city sewer system, citing his background as a general contractor and the high costs associated with such infrastructure work. He noted that he built his home at age 23 and has relied on a septic system since. Mr. Brunell acknowledged the Health District's role and expressed appreciation for its historical contributions to the community, sharing personal experiences from his youth and early adulthood. He voiced regret that the responsibility for the sewer issue appears to have been transferred from the Water Authority to the Health District and urged the Health District to act in the community's best interest.

Jim Cavin, a homeowner for 47 years, shared insights and concerns regarding proposed septic system regulations. He emphasized that uniform regulations may not be appropriate for diverse communities such as Sandy Valley, Mount Charleston, Moapa Valley, and Mesquite, each with unique infrastructure and property characteristics. Mr. Cavin noted that some properties may require costly pumping systems even if sewer lines are available, and that septic permits can exceed \$20,000. He cited the existence of approximately 18,500 septic systems in Clark County and expressed concern that few users were notified of the proposed changes. He questioned the basis for presenting the regulations as a health and safety issue and requested data on septic-related emergencies responded to by the Health District. He estimated the need for four full-time employees at an annual cost of \$300,000 to conduct inspections. Mr. Cavin advocated for a collaborative approach between the Health District and homeowners, suggesting that assistance should be provided when systems fail, rather than mandating costly sewer connections. He concluded by urging the Health District to present data supporting the need for regulation and cautioned against unnecessary changes to functioning systems.

Lois Thompson, a resident of the Lone Mountain area, expressed concern that the proposed septic system regulations would impose a significant financial burden on many residents. She noted the absence of a cost-benefit analysis for the program despite reviewing available materials on the Health District's website and past agendas. Ms. Thompson highlighted that many rural areas lack access to wastewater treatment facilities or have property conditions that prevent discharge to existing systems. She stated that the proposed regulations do not equitably distribute benefits among affected properties and appear to expand administrative authority over private property owners. As a closing remark, she suggested that resources would be better allocated toward addressing the mosquito problem in the area.

Cheryl Pastore, a retired golf professional with over 50 years of experience and multiple academic degrees, shared her insights on mosquito control and septic system management. Drawing from her background managing large golf courses, she recommended the use of mosquito fish and water circulation systems, such as fountains, to effectively eliminate mosquito populations and prevent algae growth in standing water. She emphasized that these methods had proven successful in her past operations, eliminating the need for chemical spraying. Ms. Pastore also voiced concerns regarding proposed septic system regulations, noting that her above-ground cement septic tank requires pumping every 4-5 years, contrary to the suggested 10-12 year interval. She criticized the financial burden and impracticality of mandated sewer hookups for senior homeowners, particularly those in cul-de-sacs, and expressed frustration over the lack of representation and understanding from decision-makers who do not live in homes with septic systems.

Seeing no one further, the Chair closed the Second Public Comment portion.

XIII. ADJOURNMENT

The Chair adjourned the meeting at 10:59 a.m.

Vivek Raman, Environmental Health Supervisor, and Christian DeHaan, Senior Environmental Health Specialist, presented the Business Impact Statement on the Proposed 2025 Public Accommodation Facilities Regulations.

Member Brune joined the meeting at 9:11 a.m.

Mr. Raman explained that the regulations were first established in 2006 and there have been no updates since they were established. Mr. Raman advised that the review and proposed revisions make the requirements clear and more concise for public accommodation operators and address areas with high frequency of violations to ultimately reduce room closures and associated fees. Mr. Raman outlined the business impact survey process and results.

Mr. DeHaan proceeded to highlight the major proposed changes.

The Chair opened for Public Comment. Seeing no one, the Chair closed the period for Public Comment.

Further to an inquiry from Member Summers-Armstrong, Mr. Raman advised that currently there were no requirements regarding mattress protectors on pull-out and sofa beds, aside from guestroom attendants removing soiled mattresses. Member Summers-Armstrong inquired regarding signage on ice dispensers and the requirement for a food handler card. Mr. Raman advised that staff dispending large buckets of ice in a kitchen were required to have a food handler card.

Further to an inquiry from Member Hardy, Mr. Raman addressed the environmental cleaning of surfaces and confirmed that the proposed regulations did not apply to short-term rentals.

Member Nielson confirmed that the Nevada Resort Association responded to the Business Impact Survey on behalf of their members. The Nevada Resort Association collected information from their members and submitted a single response to the Health District, including the cost impacts of changes, the hose bib, and mattress covers.

Member Nielson inquired regarding the regulatory oversight of short-term rentals. Mr. Raman advised that staff have undertaken significant research and advised that Code Enforcement for the various jurisdictions had oversight of short-term rentals.

Member Nielson further inquired on the next steps in the process. Mr. Raman advised, if the Board approved the Business Impact Statement, notification would be sent to all industry partners and public workshops would be held. Health District staff would collect the feedback, undertake any adjustments to the proposed regulations, and present the final proposed regulations to the Board of Health at a future meeting.

Member Bond inquired as to the complaint process of a short-term rental. Mr. Raman advised that the Health District had only received eight complaints regarding short-term rentals, which were directed to that jurisdiction's code enforcement or business license departments.

A motion was made by Member Summers-Armstrong, seconded by Member Hardy, and carried unanimously to approve the Business Impact Statement on the Proposed 2025 Public Accommodation Facilities Regulations, as presented.

 Variance Request for an existing septic system, SNHD Permit #ON0010273, located at 2625 Barbaradale Cir., Las Vegas, NV 89146 to allow existing trees to encroach on the septic system; direct staff accordingly or take other action as deemed necessary (for possible action)

Daniel Isler, Environmental Health Engineer Supervisor, presented the variance request for an existing septic system located at 2625 Barbaradale Cir., Las Vegas, NV 89146 to allow existing trees to encroach on the septic system. Mr. Isler advised that the variance stemmed from a tenant improvement request, that determined trees encroaching on the leach field. Mr. Isler advised that the trees could potentially cause root intrusion into the septic system, which could lead to hydraulic failure and sewage back-up. Mr. Isler confirmed that staff was recommending denial of the variance. However, if the Board approved the variance, staff recommended approval with conditions.

Sean Connell, the applicant, provided context for his variance request, noting that a detailed letter had already been submitted. He explained that the trees in question are several decades old and provide the only shade in his backyard; removing them would significantly impact the usability of his outdoor space. Mr. Connell stated that his septic system had been inspected and pumped multiple times over the past ten years, with no indication of malfunction. He acknowledged the potential for future issues, but emphasized that no current problems existed. He expressed concern that the presence of the trees and septic system was being used to prevent a bathroom renovation, specifically, re-tiling a shower, which he finds disproportionate. Mr. Connell offered to refrain from planting additional trees and committed to maintaining the existing system. Mr. Connell argued that any future damage would primarily affect his property and finances, not public health. He also referenced tree-planting initiatives by the water district, questioning the rationale behind requiring the removal of healthy, longstanding trees.

The Chair opened for Public Comment.

Laura McSwain, representing the Water Fairness Coalition, referenced a prior application involving a similar issue where a property owner incurred approximately \$8,000 in legal fees due to complications caused by a tree affecting their project. Ms. McSwain expressed hope that the current arguments presented support preserving the tree in question. Ms. McSwain indicated she would address related matters during the public comment period. She also noted, based on observations from a recent meeting regarding rule changes, that individuals who choose to manage their own sewer systems tend to be independent-minded. Accordingly, she expressed support for deferring to the property owner's judgment in this case.

Diane Henry encouraged approval of the variance. Ms. Henry believed the requirement to connect to a sewer main within 400 feet imposed an excessive financial burden, potentially exceeding \$40,000, based on an estimated cost of \$200 per linear foot, and unreasonable.

Christian Salmon expressed support for the homeowner's request, aligning with previous comments advocating for approval. He emphasized that the issue at hand, tiling a bathroom, should not require escalation to a public hearing, suggesting that such matters consume unnecessary time and resources. Mr. Salmon questioned the efficiency of government processes in this context. He concluded by urging approval of the homeowner's request.

Seeing no one further, the Chair closed the period for Public Comment.

Further to an inquiry from Member Hardy regarding references to the Colorado River, Mr. Isler advised that the reference was in line with the recent local goal to remove septic systems from receiving Colorado River water.

Member Hardy requested clarification on how the tree roots were involved with septic system. Mr. Isler advised that tree roots could enter the piping and break through the septic system.

Member Becker agreed that the application by the homeowner was very thorough, and she did not see an issue with the trees. Member Becker stated her support of the variance request.

Further to an inquiry from Member Brune, Mr. Isler advised there was no current requirement for homeowners to perform regular maintenance on the septic system, and believed that a single tree was to be removed. Mr. Connell advised that it had not been confirmed to him how many trees had to be removed. Mr. Connell advised that he routinely has the septic system pumped and inspected.

Further to an inquiry from the Chair regarding the suggested conditions, Mr. Connell agreed in part to the conditions, however, was concerned with the first condition regarding the requirement to connect to community sewage when available within 400 feet of the property line and can be made by gravity flow, and requested that it not be imposed at this time. Mr. Isler confirmed that the first condition was usually included in every variance application and was a requirement in the regulations.

A motion was made by Member Becker, seconded by Member Nielson, and carried unanimously to approve the Variance Request for an existing septic system, SNHD Permit #ON0010273, located at 2625 Barbaradale Cir., Las Vegas, NV 89146 to allow existing trees to encroach on the septic system, with the following conditions:

- 1. Petitioners and their successor(s) in interest shall abide by all local government regulations requiring connection to community sewage systems. Use of the ISDS shall be discontinued and the structure it serves shall be connected to any community sewage system constructed in the future to within four hundred (400) feet of the applicant's property line when connection can be made by gravity flow and the owner(s) are notified and legally required to do so.
- 2. Petitioners and their successor(s) will abide by the operation and maintenance requirements of the most current SNHD regulations governing individual sewage disposal systems.
- 3. No additional trees are allowed within ten feet (10') of the existing septic system.
- 4. The variance will be in effect until the existing residential septic system is inactivated, removed, or if the property changes land use. Conversion of the existing septic system for commercial use will result in the variance becoming null and void.
- 5. Petitioners and their successor(s) must provide a copy of the variance to potential buyers as part of the disclosure process per NRS 113.

[NOTE: Before the Second Public Comment, Member Bond stated her intention to rescind her initial opposition vote. Member Bond confirmed that she supported the variance request and wished to reflect her vote in approval.]

3. Variance Request for an existing septic system, SNHD #ON0024214, located at 5965 N. Grand Canyon Dr., Las Vegas, NV 89149 to remain underneath the existing shed; direct staff accordingly or take other action as deemed necessary (for possible action)

Mr. Isler presented the variance request for an existing septic system located at 5965 N. Grand Canyon Dr., Las Vegas, NV 89149 to remain underneath the existing shed. Mr. Isler advised that the variance stemmed from a tenant improvement request, wherein the homeowner, constructed a shed over the leach field. Mr. Isler noted that the shed was 400 square feet, which requires a building permit process. Through the permitting process the Health District is notified and would have directed the shed be built in another location. Mr. Isler confirmed that there was no building permit associated with the shed. Mr. Isler confirmed that staff was recommending denial of the variance, as sewer was available less than 400 feet from the property. However, if the Board approved the variance, staff recommended approval with conditions.

Matthew Vance, the homeowner, was not in attendance.

The Chair opened for Public Comment.

Diane Henry indicated that if the Board were to approve and impose the conditions, the homeowner was already within 400 feet. Ms. Henry inquired whether the intention was for the homeowner to connect to sewer right now.

Christian Salmon requested that the Board vote in favor of the homeowner and stated this was punitive.

Seeing no one further, the Chair closed the period for Public Comment.

Mr. Isler addressed the first condition regarding connection to sewer within 400 feet and confirmed that the Health District was not notifying the homeowner that they were required to connect to sewer.

Member Summers-Armstrong inquired whether removing the floor would render the shed unusable. Mr. Isler was unable to answer, but confirmed that the shed was built without a permit.

Further to an inquiry from the Chair, Mr. Isler advised that the property was a residential, private farm with animals and the shed was used by cats and to store feed for the farm animals. Mr. Isler noted that the application indicated that moving or removing the shed would make it impossible to care for the animals.

Further to inquiries from Member Becker and Member Gallo regarding the shed only covering 20% of the leach field, Mr. Iser advised that the leach field could not be covered by any impermeable surface, regardless of certain percentage of coverage.

Further to an inquiry from the Chair, Mr. Isler advised that the recommendation would be to remove the entire floor of the shed.

Member Summers-Armstrong inquired whether the property was zoned for farm animals, and if it was not, then making an accommodation for use that is not allowed would place the Board in conflict. Member Hardy noted that the homeowner's cats use the shed, and cats kill rodents, which is a health issue not be ignored.

The Chair noted that the homeowner was not present to address many of the Board's questions and suggested that the variance request be moved to a future meeting to allow Mr. Vance to attend.

A motion was made by Chair Black, seconded by Member Hardy, and carried unanimously that the Variance Request for an existing septic system, SNHD #ON0024214, located at 5965 N. Grand Canyon Dr., Las Vegas, NV 89149 to remain underneath the existing shed, be continued until a future Board of Health meeting.

4. Variance Request for an existing septic system, SNHD #ON0015884, located at 3107 Ramrod Street, Las Vegas, NV 89108 to remain underneath the existing driveway; direct staff accordingly or take other action as deemed necessary (for possible action)

Mr. Isler presented the variance request for an existing septic system located at 3107 Ramrod Street, Las Vegas, NV 89108 to remain underneath the existing driveway. Mr. Isler noted the septic system dated back to 1974 and that the circular driveway covered approximately 60% of the leach field. Mr. Isler further noted that the property was a Las Vegas Valley Water District customer, with a production well within a mile of property. Mr. Isler confirmed that staff was recommending denial of the variance. However, if the Board approved the variance, staff recommended approval with conditions.

David Tabaczynski, the homeowner, provided background on his property, purchased five years ago and originally built in 1978. He emphasized that the septic system, including the tank and leach field, was approved by the Clark County Health District and the building department at the time of construction. Prior to purchase, the system was professionally inspected and found to be fully functional. The tank is regularly maintained and pumped every three years. Mr. Tabaczynski noted that the leach field is partially located beneath a circular driveway, but there have been no signs of system failure or public health concerns; no odors, surface issues, or drainage problems. He also confirmed that the proximity of a newly anticipated pool complies with recommended distances from both the tank and leach field. He stated that the system has operated without issue for over 45 years and cited research indicating that properly maintained septic systems can last up to 100 years. He requested removal of a stipulation preventing closure of the building permit for the pool, citing continued functionality, proper maintenance, and lack of any environmental or public safety impact. He also noted that removing the driveway would cost approximately \$15,000, despite no evidence of system compromise.

The Chair opened for Public Comment.

Christian Salmon raised questions regarding impact of a property with a leach field located beneath a driveway. He noted that the homeowner had conducted inspections and taken steps to identify any issues. Mr. Salmon questioned who would be harmed if the system failed, suggesting the homeowner would bear the consequences. He requested clarification on how the septic system failures could pose broader public health risks, including surfacing wastewater and groundwater contamination. Mr. Salmon emphasized that leach fields are designed to allow wastewater to percolate and be naturally filtered before reaching the water table. He noted that septic systems have been used safely for decades and that any failure would force the homeowner to take corrective action due to immediate impacts like sewage backup. He also pointed out that water used in the valley is partially reclaimed, suggesting minimal long-term loss and reinforcing that the homeowner would be the primary party affected.

Seeing no one further, the Chair closed the period for Public Comment.

Member Summers-Armstrong commended the homeowner on following the proper process and being well informed of the requirements. Member Summers-Armstrong stated her support of the variance request.

Member Brune noted that the property did not have many trees and inquired whether a condition could be imposed to not plant any additional trees on the property near the septic system. Mr. Isler advised that the Board had the authority to include an additional condition regarding no trees within ten feet of the existing septic system.

Further to an inquiry from the Chair, Mr. Tabaczynski was agreeable to the conditions noted in the materials, and with the additional condition regarding no trees within ten feet (10') of the existing septic system.

A motion was made by Member Summers-Armstrong, seconded by Member Brune, and carried by a vote of 8-1 to approve the Variance Request for an existing septic system, SNHD #ON0015884, located at 3107 Ramrod Street, Las Vegas, NV 89108 to remain underneath the existing driveway, with the following conditions:

- 1. Petitioner and their successor(s) in interest shall abide by all local government regulations requiring connection to community sewage systems. Use of the ISDS shall be discontinued and the structure it serves shall be connected to any community sewage system constructed in the future to within four hundred (400) feet of the Petitioner's property line when connection can be made by gravity flow and the owner(s) are notified and legally required to do so.
- 2. Petitioner and their successor(s) will abide by the operation and maintenance requirements of the most current SNHD regulations governing individual sewage disposal systems.
- 3. The variance will be in effect until the existing residential septic system is inactivated, removed, or if the property changes land use. Conversion of the existing septic system for commercial use will result in the variance becoming null and void.
- 4. Petitioners and their successor(s) must provide a copy of the variance to potential buyers as part of the disclosure process per NRS 113.
- 5. No trees are allowed within ten feet (10') of the existing septic system.

VIII. REPORT / DISCUSSION / ACTION

There were no items heard.

IX. BOARD REPORTS: The Southern Nevada District Board of Health members may identify and comment on Health District related issues. Comments made by individual Board members during this portion of the agenda will not be acted upon by the Southern Nevada District Board of Health unless that subject is on the agenda and scheduled for action. (Information Only)

Member Nemec raised the topic of the West Coast Health Alliance, which the Nevada State Board of Health was currently considering joining. This alliance comprises several western states, including California, Oregon, Washington, and Hawaii, and aims to address recent leadership changes within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) that have, according to the alliance, impacted the independence of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and introduced increased partisanship into scientific decision-making. Member Nemec expressed hope that the State of Nevada would formally join the alliance.

Member Summers-Armstrong expressed support for the recommendation regarding participation in the West Coast Health Alliance. She noted that similar initiatives were underway in other regions of the country and emphasized the importance of ensuring continued access to critical public health resources, including vaccinations for influenza, COVID-19, and RSV. Member Summers-Armstrong stated that when she was an assembly member her district was significantly

impacted during the initial stages of the COVID-19 pandemic. She acknowledged the life-saving role of scientific advancements and voiced concern about the potential challenges in maintaining access to necessary vaccines.

X. HEALTH OFFICER & STAFF REPORTS (Information Only)

DHO Comments

In addition to the written report, Dr. Lockett confirmed that a vaccination update will be provided at the next Board meeting to include information regarding the Health District's standing order and ongoing efforts to expand COVID-19 vaccine eligibility for clients.

Presentation on Short-Term Rentals

Mr. Raman and Mr. DeHaan presented on short-term rentals. Mr. Raman advised that in preparation for the presentation, they contacted code enforcement agencies, reviewed municipal codes, county ordinances, and available resources for the different jurisdictions.

There was robust discussion on the current inspection protocols for short-term rentals and the extent to which public health considerations are included.

The Chair proposed that the Health District collaborate with jurisdictions to develop a public health checklist based on existing public accommodation regulations. This checklist could serve as a standard for issuing business licenses and special use permits, ensuring that health concerns such as pest control and pool cleanliness are addressed upfront.

Member Brune cautioned against duplicating existing complaint systems and advocated for working in partnership with jurisdictions to streamline processes. The Chair agreed, emphasizing that each jurisdiction operates differently and that the Health District's role should focus on providing information and guidance to support consistent public health standards. There was consensus on the need for a legal review of the NRS related to short-term rentals, development of a public health inspection framework, and improved coordination between the Health District and local jurisdictions.

Member Bond stated her intention to rescind her initial vote in opposition to Item VII.2, concerning the variance request for an existing septic system (SNHD Permit #ON0010273), located at 2625 Barbaradale Circle, Las Vegas, NV 89146. Member Bond confirmed that she now supported the variance request and wishes her vote to reflect approval.

XII. SECOND PUBLIC COMMENT: A period devoted to comments by the general public, if any, and discussion of those comments, about matters relevant to the Board's jurisdiction will be held. Comments will be limited to five (5) minutes per speaker. If any member of the Board wishes to extend the length of a presentation, this may be done by the Chair or the Board by majority vote.

Laura McSwain expressed appreciation for the community engagement observed during the meeting and shared concerns stemming from a workshop meeting she attended. Representing the Water Fairness Coalition, she emphasized the organization's focus on water policy and government overreach. McSwain cautioned against an overemphasis on Colorado River water issues, noting that residents using septic systems are being overlooked. She raised concerns about Southern Nevada Water Authority's (SNWA) approach to acquiring water credits that affect existing residents. McSwain referenced Commissioner Gibson's remarks regarding the proposed waiver process and associated fees and noted that such costs should not be passed on to residents, as fees ranging from \$40,000 to \$100,000. Ms. McSwain also cited Commissioner Kirkpatrick's identification of the issue as a billion-dollar problem. Ms. McSwain asserted that the financial burden should be borne by the government rather than individual homeowners. Ms. McSwain stated that the quality of community life was deteriorating due to the removal of trees. Additionally, she voiced concern over proposed septic rule changes requiring reapplication every five years, questioning the strain this would place on Health District resources. Ms. McSwain praised the thoughtful public input received and encouraged continued direct engagement with affected constituents. She concluded by urging reconsideration of the proposed regulations.

Diane Henry expressed concern regarding the lack of public notice for the recent workshop, noting that over 100 attendees participated despite limited awareness and the meeting being held during a weekday morning. She recommended future workshops be publicly noticed in local media, such as the Las Vegas Review-Journal, similar to prior meetings regarding business impact statements. Ms. Henry highlighted widespread community concern over proposed changes to septic system regulations, particularly the financial burden on homeowners. She opposed replacing permanent septic permits with five-year revocable permits, citing the potential for forced sewer connections without available funding support. She noted that septic-to-sewer conversions typically cost at least \$40,000, which poses a significant hardship, especially for residents in older neighborhoods like Section 10. Ms. Henry acknowledged SNWA's conversion programs but criticized the limited funding, reimbursement model, and restrictive eligibility. Ms. Henry outlined additional proposed costs, including permit fees, mandatory inspections, appeal fees, and requirements for nitrogen removal systems. She also referenced anticipated annual septic fees and mandated septic pumping and well water testing, all of which could negatively impact property values. Ms. Henry shared the experience of her neighbor who, after a fire, faced over \$100,000 in costs to resolve a septic issue related to a pool built by previous owners. Ms. Henry urged the Board of Health not to implement regulation changes or mandate sewer connections until adequate funding is available to assist affected homeowners.

My name is Christian Salmon, S-A-L-M-O-N. Under NRS 624.331, I invoke the privilege that all my comments be verbatim, word for word. Also, I'd like to give you, because I did not do this yesterday. Can I give the officer these comments? This has a lot of the arguments that were made yesterday. I'd like to give them to each of the Board members so they, so they have them themselves. Thank you so much. So thank you so much. I appreciate your time here, guys. I know it was, it was heated yesterday and Mr. Isler, I appreciate him providing all the information. Um. And we're all here trying to do something. You're here, doing your best to act on our behalf and that's what, that's what we'd like and we have problems in society we want to solve. I think our representative was on the news last night. She was also participatory in the meeting yesterday,

Lisa Cole and she said in the legislature up in up north, there's a common quote, searching for a problem with which to institute a regulation. Or there's another way to put it, when your tool is regulation, everything looks like a problem in need of one. And so some of these things we're looking at, not just here in this room, but other places, it's, it's overbearing, it's too much it's not really looking to solve the particular problem. Some of the questions I have and other neighbors have is what quantity of water, so talking about septic systems and converting over to sewer, what quantity of water will be reclaimed by converting from septic systems to municipality sewers? Also, no, no water is lost if water goes into the septic system, correct? I mean these are, these are basic things that we've, we've heard them if if you listen to a long session like this and there are horrendously ignorant. What they're saying is, and it's not, it's blatantly, blatantly false. The other thing I'm going to say is, and I asked yesterday, you know, is this basically a public health agency or a public water policy agency? This is coming over here and you guys have a purview of what you're supposed to do regarding health. They need to fight their own battles and not dump it in your lap. That's my opinion. Again, regarding the applications here today, who's the victim if the water is not going to hurt anybody and and they can't survive without a septic system, it will fix itself because they have to. I mean, at some point I guess you could come in and do something, but this is all before it happens. This is pre-crime, I guess. It's kind of like that movie that was out with. I forgot his name now, but Minority Report, you know, so we have a system in this country where people are innocent until proven guilty and nothing has happened yet. A lot of times we feel, I'm speaking from my area too I live in the Northwest, Northwest rural preservation neighborhood and our neighbors, we are so sick of having to come to all these meetings and we constantly get talked down to like, we're stupid, not that that was done here, so that's where some of this comes from, I just want to relay that. And and we'd like, like we don't know anything and we constantly have to fight for what we have already bought into. We bought into our home with a septic, with a well, whatever, zoning, all these things should be forever, you know, should not, unless there's a major change that everybody agrees to. But we're we're being forced and and we're bludgeoned to death with government. It's weaponizing government. And that's not what this is supposed to be. I love government. Government should be around to protect, protect from anarchy. We've got to have some rules in place. But when you constantly are barraged by people that are on the public servants, they're not servants anymore. They're coming after us constantly. And that's how it feels. You know, I'd like to ask would the Board members, and I've asked Belanger, who's the head negotiator and lobbyist for the SNWA and Las Vegas Valley Water District, will you meet with me to look at new opportunities to find water? Because I've seen them out there, and he, he, he doesn't return a phone call back. We debated over at AB220 at length and a lot, all of us did and and that's not within their, what they, want you know. So IIII just wanted, I just want to let this one last thing. If we had more back and forth dialogue, then I wouldn't need to go further than 5 minutes. We would love to have this with all public agencies, so we have it, we can find the common ground and agree. I support you guys. Thank you for your time.

Carol Reynolds, a resident of Section 11, shared her personal perspective shaped by her early career as a field worker for the state of Nevada, where she conducted home visits to assess welfare eligibility. Her experiences with vulnerable populations instilled a lifelong concern about financial security in retirement, which she and her husband planned for carefully. Ms. Reynolds expressed deep concern over what she described as an "undeclared war" on longtime local residents, citing recent increases in water-related fees and proposed septic regulations. She believes these changes pose a serious financial threat to homeowners, particularly seniors on fixed incomes who previously installed septic systems when no other options were available. Ms. Reynolds warned that the proposed regulations, such as revocable permits and increased inspections, could leave residents at the mercy of county inspectors, potentially resulting in

financial ruin. Ms. Reynolds characterized this as a form of elder abuse and urged the Board of Health not to move forward with these changes until adequate financial support is available for affected homeowners.

Seeing no one further, the Chair closed the Second Public Comment portion.

BACKGROUND:

Clark County established a self-funded group medical and dental benefits program in 1984 to provide group medical and dental benefits to the employees of Clark County and affiliated entities. The program consists of a preferred provider organization (PPO) plan and an exclusive provider organization (EPO) plan. The last premium increase of 5% for actives and early retirees for both the PPO and EPO plans was approved September 17, 2024, for plan year 2025. Another premium increase of 5% is being proposed for the PPO and EPO plans for plan year 2026. This increase will impact actives and early retirees participating in either plan, as well as Medicare retirees participating in the EPO plan. There is no proposed increase for Medicare retirees participating in the PPO plan.

Effective January 1, 2026, each public entity will be required to remit an additional annual premium to be set aside in a reserve in order to fund high dollar claims over \$750,000 that are becoming increasingly more common due to changes in life expectancy as well as changes in technology. The amendment to the Interlocal Agreement will allow for the collection of an additional premium equal to an amount not to exceed \$15 per active employee participating in the PPO and EPO plans per month.

AMENDMENT TO INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, CLARK COUNTY, NEVADA; CLARK COUNTY WATER RECLAMATION DISTRICT; UNIVERSITY MEDICAL CENTER OF SOUTHERN NEVADA; THE LAS VEGAS CONVENTION AND VISITORS AUTHORITY; THE LAS VEGAS VALLEY WATER DISTRICT; CLARK COUNTY REGIONAL FLOOD CONTROL DISTRICT; THE REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION OF SOUTHERN NEVADA; THE SOUTHERN NEVADA HEALTH DISTRICT; THE HENDERSON DISTRICT PUBLIC LIBRARIES; THE MOUNT CHARLESTON FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT; THE LAS VEGAS METROPOLITAN POLICE DEPARTMENT; THE MOAPA VALLEY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT; AND THE EIGHTH JUDICIAL DISTRICT COURT have jointly established a health, accident and life benefit program for their officers, employees, retirees and their dependents pursuant to an Interlocal Agreement, as amended, hereinafter referred to as the Agreement, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Agreement, the parties hereto subsequently adopted a self-funded group medical and dental preferred provider organization (PPO) plan and a self-funded group medical and dental exclusive provider organization (EPO) plan, hereinafter referred to as the Benefit Plans; and

WHEREAS, the rising cost of health care requires that, from time to time, the premiums paid by the parties be increased to maintain the Benefit Plans.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is agreed between the parties that the terms and conditions of the Agreement be amended to read as follows:

- Each public agency will adopt and abide by specified Benefit Plan documents, which establish the terms and conditions of a self-funded medical and dental benefit program for enrolled employees, retirees and eligible dependents.
- Clark County shall establish an internal service fund for the deposit of contributions and the payment of expenses for the operation of the benefit program.
- 3. On or before the 1st day of each month, beginning November 1, 1984, each public entity, which is a party to the Agreement, shall pay to Clark County its proportionate share of the monthly charges necessary to operate the Benefit Plans. In addition, each public entity shall budget, each year beginning July 1, 2001, an extra month (13th month) employer share in order to provide funds when, and if, the Executive Board determines, by majority vote of the members present, to remit additional funds, by the end of the fiscal year, in order to pay for unanticipated expenditures. The share of each public entity shall be calculated based on the number of employees, retirees and

dependents participating in the Benefit Plans. Effective January 1, 2014, the above referenced 13th month employer share premium payment will be replaced with a billing to each public entity for its portion of the underfunded retiree loss incurred the previous full calendar year. Each public entity's portion of the underfunded retiree loss will be based on each agency's proportionate share of the retirees enrolled in the Benefit Plans. Effective January 1, 2026, each public entity shall remit an additional annual premium, by the end of the fiscal year, to be set aside in a reserve in order to fund high dollar claims over \$750,000 that are becoming increasingly more common to the Benefit Plans due to changes in life expectancy as well as changes in technology. Each public entity's premium will be equal to an amount not to exceed \$15 per active employee participating in the Benefit Plans per month. The rates for the Benefit Plans shall be as set forth in the rate schedule attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by this reference. The rates for continuation of coverage pursuant to the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1985, hereinafter referred to as "COBRA" P.L. 99-272, Title X, 10003, 100 Stat. 82, 232-237, shall be set forth in the rate schedule attached hereto as Exhibit "B" and incorporated herein by this reference.

- 4. A public agency, requesting participation in the Benefit Plans, shall pay an actuarially determined amount to fund their share of the Benefit Plans reserves and assets. The funding amount shall be paid on behalf of each participant who initially enrolls in the Benefit Plans.
- The internal service fund, together with all interest or other accumulations, shall be used for the payment of expenses and charges necessary to provide the health, accident and life benefit program.
- 6. Clark County shall establish an Executive Board not to exceed seven members, which shall consist of representatives of management appointed from the governmental agencies participating in this agreement. The Executive Board shall meet periodically to review the financial performance of the program and evaluate and recommend contractors to the Board of County Commissioners, and negotiate plan changes with the Service Employees International Union subject to the approval of the governing bodies.
- 7. Clark County shall establish a seven-member committee, which shall consist of representatives from both labor and management appointed from the governmental agencies participating in the self-funded group medical and dental PPO plan. Effective January 1, 1991, the committee membership shall be increased to nine members. Effective December 1, 1994, the committee membership shall be increased to ten members through the addition of a labor representative. The committee shall meet periodically to resolve disputes and appeals from the claims administrator. Any disputes and appeals related to the self-funded group medical and dental EPO plan will be resolved by the claims administrator and shall not be discussed by the committee.

- 8. Each public agency may withdraw from this Agreement and participation in the benefit program by giving notice thereof sixty days prior to the anniversary date of the benefit program. Upon the public agency's withdrawal from the Benefit Plans the public agency may be eligible for a distribution of reserves and/or net assets to the extent that:
 - A. All claims and expenses attributable to the public agency have been paid;
 - B. As required by NRS 354.6215, and as a result of the public agency's withdrawal from the Benefit Plans, the Board of County Commissioners has determined that an amount of the reserve or balance is no longer required, either in whole or in part; and
 - C. The amount of such excess reserve or balance is a result of contributions or premiums paid directly attributable to the public agency.
- 9. The effective date of the Las Vegas Valley Water District's participation in this Agreement shall be January 1, 1991.
- 10. The Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada and the Clark County Regional Flood Control District, effective January 1, 2002, shall be recognized as separate participating members in this Agreement.
- 11. The effective date of the Southern Nevada Health District's participation in this Agreement shall be August 1, 2009.
- 12. The effective date of the Mount Charleston Fire Protection District's participation in this Agreement shall be May 19, 2015.
- 13. The effective date of the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department's participation in this Agreement shall be January 1, 2016. Participation is limited to the employer's appointed staff and dependents, and effective July 1, 2019, Deputy Sheriffs, and effective January 1, 2024, Police Protective Association Civilian Employees.
- 14. The effective date of the Moapa Valley Fire Protection District's participation in this Agreement shall be July 27, 2020. Participation is limited to Management Plan employees and their covered dependents.
- 15. The effective date of the Eighth Judicial District Court's participation in this Agreement shall be July 1, 2022.
- 16. Effective January 1, 2014, any participating public agency's contemplated change in the employer/employee premium contribution calculation is subject to prior approval by the Plan Administrator, and may not be made absent Plan Administrator approval.
- 17. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as limiting the ability of any party hereto to decline to participate in any individual health, life or accident program jointly adopted by the parties pursuant to this Agreement, nor does it preclude any party hereto from providing its employees with a health, life or accident program not jointly adopted under this Agreement. Any party choosing not to participate in such jointly adopted program shall notify, in writing,

- the Chief Financial Officer, or designee, not later than sixty days prior to the initial effective date of that program or, if already in place, sixty days prior to the anniversary date of that program.
- 18. This Interlocal Agreement embodies all of the agreements of the parties hereto with respect to any matter covered or mentioned in this Interlocal Agreement. No prior agreements or understandings pertaining to such matters, whether written or oral, shall be effective for any purpose after the effective date of this Agreement. No provision of this Interlocal Agreement shall be modified or added to except by an agreement in writing signed by the parties hereto. For the purpose of interpretation, this Interlocal Agreement has been prepared by all the parties hereto.

During the designation period, Sunrise Hospital & Medical Center (SHMC) underwent capacity enhancements, including the addition of thirty bed observation unit, opened a new diagnostic center, extended breast center, and opened a Free-Standing Emergency Department.			

Briefly describe any changes in the hospitals capabilities to provide trauma services in the community during the past designation period

SHMC operates with a highly qualified team dedicated to delivering comprehensive care for patients with traumatic injuries. Whether patients arrive via EMS, private vehicle, or are transferred for a higher level of care, SHMC ensures appropriate staffing and maintains the necessary capacity, equipment, and medical resources to provide effective treatment, monitoring, and resuscitation.

The hospital offers access to a full spectrum of surgical specialists, including expertise in soft tissue coverage, craniofacial surgery, replantation, and microvascular procedures. In addition, SHMC provides a wide range of medical specialists, including—but not limited to—Emergency Medicine, Anesthesiology, Interventional Radiology, and Radiology.

Recent advancements at SHMC include the opening of a second hybrid operating room, the establishment of a dedicated vascular service line, and the enhancement of cardiac electrophysiology capabilities through Pulse Field Ablation (PFA). The hospital has also expanded its epilepsy monitoring unit and successfully recruited the state's only pediatric ENT specialist, expected to begin in Fall 2025.

SHMC employs over 3,855 staff members and has more than 1,555 physicians and advanced practice providers on its medical team. The Trauma Program has recently expanded with the addition of a sixth Performance Improvement Coordinator. Furthermore, the leadership title of Trauma Program Director has been elevated to Vice President of Trauma Services, reflecting the programs continued growth and importance.

SHMC remains dedicated to supplying the necessary personnel, facilities, and equipment to care for critically injured patients. Additionally, the hospital actively supports trauma-related education, outreach, injury prevention, research, scholarly activities, and post-graduate education. This commitment is further reflected in SHMCs collaborative role within Clark County's trauma care system, reinforcing its alignment with state and regional Trauma Standards.

Additional information the applicant would like to provide in support of their request:

SHMC remains committed to its mission of serving the community by providing high-quality trauma care, supported by a dedicated team of clinical and ancillary professionals. The hospital actively partners with both local and national organizations to provide outreach education and promote injury prevention. Since 1993, SHMC has led Safe Kids Clark County, Nevada, and is proud to be a designated Trauma Survivors Network facility.

SHMC is deeply committed to trauma-focused professional development. It offers a range of specialized courses, including Advanced Trauma Life Support (ATLS) for physicians, Trauma Nursing Core Course (TNCC) and Trauma Care After Resuscitation (TCAR) for nurses, and targeted trauma education for EMS personnel. The hospital also hosts paramedic student rotations, playing a key role in training and supporting first responders within enhanced clinical exposure.

SHMC's SimAmbulance is a cutting-edge mobile simulation unit featuring a high-fidelity mannequin for realistic trauma training. It provides hands-on experience for prehospital personnel and travels to rural

hospitals and fire departments to support consistent, high-quality care across the region.

In partnership with HCA Healthcare and Galen College of Nursing, SHMC supports the expansion of nursing education to address the national nursing shortage and promote lifelong nursing careers. This collaboration enhances access to education, fosters career development, and ensures that graduates are well-prepared to deliver exceptional patient care.

As a teaching hospital, SHMC plays a vital role in Graduate Medical Education (GME), training future physicians through a combination of hands-on clinical experience and academic mentorship.

In recognition of its excellence, SHMC earned American College of Surgeons (ACS) Trauma Verification as a Level I Adult and Level II Pediatric Trauma Center during the site visit conducted on July-910, 2024. This achievement underscores SHMCs unwavering commitment to clinical excellence, education, and community service.

SHMC notes the Petition for Judicial Review currently pending before the First Judicial District Court of Nevada, Case No. 25OC000401B, which legally challenges the decision of the Southern Nevada Health District and its Board of Health's denial of SHMC's application for provisional designation as a Level I trauma center (the "Petition"). COVID-19 Vaccine update

Updated COVID-19 vaccines are now available at Southern Nevada Health District Immunization Clinics for all individuals 6 months and older. Seasonal vaccines, including flu and RSV, are also available for all recommended age groups. Clients with private insurance are advised to confirm coverage with their health insurance provider.

Vaccines are available at all Health District Immunization Clinics by appointment. Most health plans, including Medicare and Medicaid, cover recommended vaccines. Uninsured children and adults may qualify for free vaccines through VFC or Section 317. Appointments can be made at www.snhd.info/immunizations or by calling (702) 759-0850.

COVID-19 vaccine eligibility and recommendations

COVID-19 vaccines are recommended for people ages 6 months and older.

- People recently infected with COVID-19 should wait four to six months before getting the updated vaccine.
- Those who received a previous COVID-19 vaccine should wait at least two months before getting the updated version.

Flu vaccine eligibility and recommendations

The seasonal flu vaccine is recommended for everyone 6 months and older. Children younger than 9 need two doses if they have received fewer than two flu vaccine doses prior to July 1, 2024. September and October are the recommended months for vaccination for most people.

During the 2024–2025 flu season, Clark County reported 109 deaths and 1,874 hospitalizations, up from 92 deaths and 1,405 hospitalizations the prior year. Flu surveillance for the 2025–2026 season begins September 28, 2025, and runs through May 23, 2026. Weekly Influenza Surveillance Snapshot reports are posted on the Health District website beginning in October.

RSV vaccine and monoclonal antibody recommendations

RSV vaccines are recommended for:

- Adults 75 and older.
- Adults 60–74 at increased risk for severe RSV who have not been previously vaccinated.
- Pregnant people between 32 and 36 weeks of pregnancy between September and January to provide newborns with early protection.

RSV is not an annual vaccine. Once vaccinated, revaccination is not needed.

Monoclonal antibodies are recommended for:

- All infants younger than 8 months unless their mother was considered immune during pregnancy.
- Children 8–19 months at higher risk of severe RSV.

While RSV season timing can vary, administration of monoclonal antibodies is recommended October through March in most of the continental United States.

Safe a Life Day

The Southern Nevada Health District partnered with SOAR WV (Solutions Oriented Addiction Response of West Virginia) and hundreds of organizations nationwide on Thursday, September 25, to observe **Save a Life Day**—a national day dedicated to providing free naloxone.

SOAR, based in Charleston, West Virginia, is a national movement that promotes the health, dignity and voices of individuals impacted by drug use. In 2024, more than 650 SOAR events were held in 35 states, distributing over 84,000 doses of naloxone at no cost.

In 2024, there were 802 drug overdoses in Clark County, 454 of which involved fentanyl. Opioid-involved overdose deaths more than doubled, increasing 111.9% among Clark County residents from 2018 to 2024. Fentanyl-involved overdose deaths increased sevenfold, rising 699.8% from 2018 to 2024.

Naloxone is a safe, effective medication that reverses opioid overdoses. For Save a Life Day, the Health District and community partners will host free distribution events to provide low-barrier access to naloxone. The Health District also encourages community members to get trained in overdose response and to carry naloxone in case they witness an overdose.

The pharmacies at the Health District's Main Public Health Center and Fremont Public Health Center also provide naloxone and other harm reduction supplies year-round, during regular operating hours.

Pop-Up Produce Stands

Pop-Up Produce Stands have returned to the Bonneville Transit Center (BTC) this fall to offer affordable, regionally grown fruits and vegetables. Shoppers can use SNAP/EBT, cash, debit or credit cards. The stands will be open from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., or while supplies last, at the BTC, 101 E. Bonneville Ave., Las Vegas, NV 89101. Dates for the remainder of the year are:

- Tuesday, Nov. 4
- Tuesday, Nov. 18 (third Tuesday due to Veterans Day)
- Tuesday, Dec. 2
- Tuesday, Dec. 9

The program aims to make healthy food more accessible and reduce food insecurity in Southern Nevada. In 2023, Clark County's food insecurity rate was 16%, affecting 366,710 people—higher than both Nevada (15.1%) and the United States (14.3%). More than one in five children in Clark County, equivalent to 111,180 children (22%), experienced food insecurity. Rates among Black residents (28%) were more than double those of White residents (13%), underscoring significant disparities. In 2019, the U.S. Department of Agriculture identified 30 census tracts in Clark County as food deserts, highlighting persistent barriers to healthy food access.

The produce stands are a partnership of the Southern Nevada Health District's Office of Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion, the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada and Prevail Marketplace.

In 2024, the stands generated \$3,275 in sales and distributed 2,471 pounds of fresh produce. About 26% of sales were made using SNAP/EBT benefits, demonstrating the program's role in improving healthy food access for families who may be experiencing barriers to accessing healthy foods. Shoppers also receive healthy recipe cards, nutrition education and other health resources. The website also lists local farmers markets, including those that accept EBT, SNAP and debit or credit cards.

National Latino AIDS Awareness Day

The Southern Nevada Health District observed National Latino AIDS Awareness Day on Tuesday, October 15, spotlighting the disproportionate impact of HIV on Hispanic/Latino communities and promoting prevention, testing, treatment and strategies to interrupt transmission.

HIV testing at Big Oh Community Health Fair

In observance of National Latino AIDS Awareness Day, the 15th Annual Big Oh Community Health Fair was held on Saturday, October 18, at the East Las Vegas Community Center. Free and open to the public, the event included rapid HIV testing and free tacos for everyone who got an onsite test. There were also rapid hepatitis C testing, free health services, vendors and entertainment. The Health Fair was sponsored by the Southern Nevada Health Consortium, Anthem Medicaid and CAN Community Health.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, about 1.2 million people in the United States are living with HIV, and 13% are unaware of their status. In 2022, there were approximately 31,800 new HIV infections nationwide; 33% (about 10,500) were among Hispanic/Latino individuals. In Clark County, there were 552 new HIV diagnoses in 2024, up from 508 in 2023, with 23% (116) among Hispanics residents. At the end of 2023, of the 12,000 people living with HIV in Clark County, 3,683 were Hispanic.

The national data underscore persistent disparities:

- Hispanic/Latino men bear a disproportionate burden: in 2022, they accounted for 9,374 of the 37,981 new HIV diagnoses in the United States (nearly one out of four).
- The rate of new HIV infections among Hispanic/Latino men is nearly three times that of White men.
- Hispanic/Latino women also face stark disparities: in 2022, there were 1,261 new HIV diagnoses among Hispanic/Latino women (about 3% of all new diagnoses), and their rate of new infection is over four times that of White women.

Year-round HIV testing is readily available in Southern Nevada:

- The Health District offers express testing at no cost from 7:30 a.m.–4 p.m. Monday through Thursday at the Southern Nevada Health District Main Public Health Center, 280 S. Decatur Blvd., Las Vegas, NV 89107. No-cost express testing is also available at the Fremont Public Health Center, 2830 E. Fremont St., Las Vegas, NV 89104, from 7:30 a.m.–4 p.m. each Friday. No appointments are needed, but clients must be asymptomatic.
- HIV testing is available at no cost at the Arleen Cooper Community Health Center at The Center, 401 S. Maryland Parkway, Las Vegas, NV 89101. Hours are 9 a.m.—5:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 9 a.m.—2 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays. Appointments are preferred, but walk-ins are accepted.
- The Health District's Collect2Protect program offers free at-home HIV tests, giving people a convenient and private option for testing. The kits can be requested through the <u>Collect2Protect</u> page.

Same-day HIV testing and treatment services are also available in the Southern Nevada Community Health Center and at the Fremont Public Health Center. HIV services include testing, medical, behavioral health, nutrition, case management, pharmaceutical, and educational services, including PEP and PrEP navigation and treatment for those who test negative. Services are offered for insured and uninsured patients. Sliding fee scale discounts are available to all patients who qualify.



COVID-19 Vaccine Standing order for administering 2025-2026 COVID-19 vaccine

PURPOSE

To reduce morbidity and mortality from COVID-19, this Southern Nevada Health District (SNHD) standing order delegates authority to qualified health care professionals within SNHD, as defined below, and outlines the policies and procedures necessary for administering the 2025-2026 COVID-19 vaccine to individuals who meet the criteria established by the Southern Nevada Health District, as supported by evidence-based guidance from the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and a robust evidence review by the University of Minnesota's Vaccine Integrity Project, and taking into consideration the recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP).

SCOPE

This standing order applies to Health District Workforce members who administer vaccinations, within their scope of practice. As of effective date of this policy, two types of vaccines are available for use at the Health District and are addressed in this standing order:

- mRNA Vaccines
 - Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine/SPIKEVAX
 - Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine/COMIRNATY

POLICY

The Health District believes COVID-19 vaccination is a cost-effective public health tool to mitigate the spread, morbidity, and mortality of COVID-19. This policy, when signed by the Chief Medical Officer, serves as a standing order authorizing health care professionals (HCP) at the Health District to assess and vaccinate people who meet the criteria in the "Procedure" section below without the need for clinician examination or direct order from the attending provider at the time of the interaction. As defined in this order, HCPs include the following licensees who hold licenses in active status: physicians licensed under NRS 630 or NRS 633, physician assistants as defined by NRS 630.015 or NRS 633.107, registered nurses and advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs) as defined by NRS 632.019 and 632.012, respectively.

PROCEDURE

1. Assess clients who would benefit from vaccination against COVID-19.

Routine COVID-19 vaccination

This section provides an overview of the recommendations for 2025-2026 COVID-19 vaccination based on updated, evidence-based guidance from the American Academy of Pediatrics, and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists. These recommendations are also informed by a new comprehensive evidence review by the Vaccine Integrity Project at the University of Minnesota that endorses the ongoing safety and efficacy of COVID-19 vaccines. 

Executive Summary

The Office of Communications issued seven News Releases and placed advertisements to raise awareness of services offered at the Mesquite Public Health Center, promoted the Your Shot campaign, and published public notices for the Septic System Regulation Workshops. Health Cards served 11,503 total clients, including 2,323 clients renewing online, and established a plan on notifying industry regarding the upcoming fee increases. The Information Technology Department continues to prepare the mobile wallet version of the Food Handler and Body Art Cards, with an anticipated launch in 2026. As of September 26, 2025, the Health District had 803 active employees. Human Resources posted 11 employment opportunities, held 48 interviews, extended 12 job offers, and onboarded four new hires. Human Resource hosted the annual Wellness Fair for staff.

- 1. Appointments continue to be required for food handler card testing and open as follows:
 - a. Advance appointments for our Decatur, Fremont, and Henderson offices open each weekday morning at 6 a.m. for that day in the following week.
 - b. Additional same-day appointments at our Decatur and Fremont offices open for booking each working day by 7:30 a.m. as staffing allows.
 - c. Same-day appointments for our Laughlin and Mesquite offices open for booking each working day at 5:00 a.m.
- 2. For the month of September, we averaged 77 "passing and paying" online renewal clients per day, with a total of 2,323 clients renewing online.
- 3. We have established a plan on how to notify industry about the fee increase approved in June by the Board of Health. 

Subject: Community Health Division Monthly Activity Report – September 2025

OFFICE OF CHRONIC DISEASE PREVENTION & HEALTH PROMOTION (OCDPHP)

A. Chronic Disease Prevention Program (CDPP)

The CDPP sponsored <u>Breastfeeding Awareness Month</u> activities in August including the **Human Milk Donor Drive** on August 30th. Over **30 people** participated in the Milk Donor Drive and **over 2,453 oz of milk was collected.** CDPP also promoted Breastfeeding Awareness Month on social media and shared a Breastfeeding Awareness Month Communication Toolkit with partners.

CDPP staff facilitates the <u>Partners for a Healthy Nevada</u> obesity prevention coalition. The PHN meeting was held in August with **41 people in attendance**. The next meeting will be held in February.

The CDPP hosted our <u>annual training and partner appreciation for the BSHOP/BeSHOP</u> programs. All BeSHOP locations and all but two (2) BSHOP locations were represented with over **25 partners attending**. The meeting featured opening remarks from our District Health Officer, impactful presentations on the power of barber and stylist engagement, and an inspiring testimonial from a Shop Talk participant. The winners of the **Pressure Point Challenge** were recognized.

Our CDPP also hosted our annual <u>Shop Talk</u> as part of the BSHOP program. This impactful activity address men's health issues that are particularly relevant in the African American community. This year's Shop Talk was open to father-son and mentees and focused on **building generational health. Congressman Steven Horsford** shared opening remarks about his personal cardiovascular health journey and other panelists discussed tobacco use and mental health's relationship to cardiovascular health. Over 25 people attended this event.

Team CDPP worked with <u>Three Square Regional Food Bank</u> to develop a **nutrition standards policy** that aligns with the Healthy Eating Research (HER) guidelines. A committee of Three Square employees at all levels of the organization were involved in guiding development of the policy. The **policy was approved by the Board of Directors in August**.

This same CDPP also worked with two (2) faith-based pantries to implement the **Supporting** Wellness at Pantries (SWAP) program and develop nutrition standards policies in alignment with the HER guidelines. Both pantries implemented SWAP and adopted policies in August. Nutrition environment assessments in both pantries increased from pre- to post-implementation from 70 to 80 and 30 to 56. These pantries serve over **900 people** each month.

CDPP worked with the <u>Regional Transportation Commission</u> to collect feedback on future bike share locations that align with the **All-Access Mobility Plan** and support future mobility hub locations and/or help build the infrastructure needed to connect to future mobility hubs. As part of this project, CDPP supported the implementation of four (4) new bike share locations in August.

B. Tobacco Control Program (TCP) Update

This month, staff launched **new youth-focused educational** tobacco initiatives <u>on social media</u> to <u>increase awareness about the dangers of experimentation with tobacco products</u>, including ecigarettes and other emerging tobacco products.

Staff established a partnership with the CCSD Family Engagement Center to promote the SNHD Latino-focused tobacco prevention initiative Por Mi Por Ti Por Nosotros (PMPT) and encourage tobacco-free lifestyles. The Family Engagement Department offers all CCSD families, valuable resources and learning opportunities designed to empower and educate them in supporting their children's overall well-being and academic success. The goal of this collaboration is to deliver a series of activities including educational workshops, participation in family wellness nights, pledge campaigns, and resource sharing that help families remain smoke-free and vape-free. Updated, audience-specific materials are currently being developed to ensure the messaging is clear, relevant, and effective.

The Southern Nevada Health District Tobacco Control and Prevention Program provided an **educational session on "Raising Smoke-Free Kids"** during the Mater Academy open house. The presentation, <u>tailored for parents and caregivers of middle and high school students, addressed youth vaping trends, signs of use, health risks, and strategies for family conversations</u>. The session included resource sharing and highlighted the Por Mi Por Ti Por Nosotros (PMPT) initiative through which families received culturally relevant information and tools designed to empower parents and better support the prevention of vape and tobacco use among youth. Educational resources were distributed during the session to 100 parents and guardians.

II. OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES & TRAUMA SYSTEM (OEMSTS)

The OEMSTS plays a vital role in maintaining a responsive, well-trained, and integrated EMS and trauma system that serves the diverse needs of Southern Nevada's population.

A. <u>September Meetings</u>

Drug/Device/Protocol Committee (DDP)

The DDP Committee assists the OEMSTS, the Medical Advisory Board (MAB), and the QI Directors Committee in researching, developing, and editing new and existing protocols. Members include volunteer representatives from permitted agencies, receiving hospitals, and individuals involved with the training of EMS professionals.

The Committee reviewed all obstetrical emergencies protocols.

Medical Advisory Board (MAB)

The primary mission of the MAB is to support the Health Officer's role to ensure quality patient care within the EMS system by making recommendations and assisting in the ongoing design, operation, and evaluation of the EMS system from initial patient access to definitive patient care. The members include: 1) One medical director of each firefighting/franchised agency; 2) One operational director of each firefighting/franchised agency; 3) Chairman of the Regional Trauma Advisory Board; and 4) An employee of the District whose duties relate to the administration and enforcement of EMS Regulations as an ex-officio member.

The Board discussed transport destinations for sexual assault patients, the Emergency Medical Responder level of certification, and UMC's Crisis Stabilization Center.

The Health Equity Program continues to strengthen community partnerships and collaborations aimed at increasing the capacity of local communities to address health disparities.

Key Activities in September:

1. Community Convening Meeting

A. On September 10th, in collaboration with the Alzheimer's Association, the Health Equity program was a guest on the Healthier Tomorrow Radio show aired on KECP Power 88. The interview focused on the Brain Initiative spear headed by the SNHD and the Alzheimer's Assoc. The Radio show is a community program funded by the Office of Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion at the SNHD.

2. Youth Advisory Board Council Launch

- A. On September 3rd, SNHD's youth advisory council **SPARK** (Students Promoting Awareness, Responsibility & Knowledge) completed their second meeting. The focus of this meeting was leadership development and introduction to health.
- B. On September 17th, SNHD's youth advisory council SPARK completed their third meeting. The focus of this meeting was to address social determinants of health and the Office of Epidemiology & Disease Surveillance presented on their program and services.

VI. SOUTHERN NEVADA PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY (SNPHL)

A. Clinical Testing: Key Updates

1. SNHD Nursing Division Support

SNPHL provides laboratory services to the SNHD Nursing Division, including:

- a) Molecular and microbiological culture testing
- b) Sexually Transmitted Disease (STD) diagnostics

2. STD Surveillance and Testing

SNPHL collaborates with the SNHD STD Department in the following activities:

- a) Participation in the CDC's Gonococcal Isolate Surveillance Project (GISP) and the enhanced GISP (eGISP).
- b) Performing NAAT and culture testing for *Neisseria gonorrhoeae* isolates, which are submitted to reference laboratories for antimicrobial susceptibility testing.
- c) Participation in eGISP Part B to expand culture-independent testing for antimicrobial resistance genes in gonococcal isolates.
- d) A detailed breakdown of monthly sample volumes provided on the accompanying table:

3. COVID-19 Testing Operations

- a) SARS-CoV-2 PCR testing is performed exclusively on the KingFisher Flex platform.
- b) SNPHL maintains a testing capacity of 2,000 tests per day, with a turnaround time (TAT) of less than 48 hours.
- c) In September, the average daily testing volume was seven (7) samples, with an average TAT of 48 hours from collection to report release.
- d) IT enhancements include streamlined patient accession and direct report verification from SNPHL's Laboratory Information Management System (LIMS) into the SNHD patient portal.
- e) High-throughput automation has been incorporated, including the Eppendorf 5073 specimen fluid handling station.

B. **Epidemiological Testing and Consultation** - Key Updates:

1. Outbreak Investigation Committee Participation

SNPHL actively participates in the SNHD Outbreak Investigation Committee and the Foodborne Illness Taskforce. There were no gastrointestinal (GI) outbreak samples were received for investigation in September.

2. Influenza Surveillance Reporting

SNPHL continues to report influenza testing results to the CDC's National Respiratory and Enteric Virus Surveillance System (NREVSS). In September, SNPHL performed seventeen (17) respiratory panel tests using the BioFire platform.

C. Emergency response and reportable disease isolate testing report - Key Activities and Capabilities:

1. Reportable Disease Isolate Testing and Confirmation

SNPHL conducts testing and confirmation of reportable disease where isolates are submitted by local laboratories. These isolates are serotyped and/or confirmed via Whole Genome Sequencing (WGS), stored on-site, and reported through national surveillance systems including:

- a) Public Health Laboratory Information System (PHLIS)
- b) National Antimicrobial Resistance Monitoring System (NARMS)
- c) Influenza Surveillance
- d) PulseNet Bacterial Outbreak Surveillance

2. Whole Genome Sequencing (WGS) Validation

SNPHL is clinically validated to use WGS for the identification of select *Campylobacter* species, pathogenic *Escherichia coli*, and *Salmonella* species. The lab is also validated for determining *Salmonella* serotypes, STEC (Shiga toxin-producing *E. coli*) serotypes, and Shiga toxin genes.

3. PulseNet Surveillance

In September 2025, SNPHL performed 24 WGS tests as part of the PulseNet Foodborne Outbreak Surveillance program.

4. Bacterial Isolate Screening

Using the Bruker MALDI-TOF instrument, SNPHL identified 218 bacterial organisms in September, streamlining the screening process for bacterial isolates.

5. SARS-CoV-2 Sequencing

SNPHL is validated for sequencing SARS-CoV-2 and variants of concern, including lineage and clade identification.

- a) Current capacity: up to 96 SARS-CoV-2-positive RNA extracts per week
- b) September 2025: 42 SARS-CoV-2-positive RNA extracts sequenced.
- c) Capacity expansion is anticipated with additional staffing, instrumentation, and method development.

6. Legionella Surveillance

SNPHL collaborates with Environmental Health and Veritas Labs for Legionella surveillance. Monthly isolate counts for 2025 are as follows:

7. Vector-Borne Disease Testing

SNPHL provides viral testing for Zika, West Nile Virus (WNV), Western Equine Encephalitis, and Saint Louis Encephalitis.

- a) September 2025: 409 mosquito pool samples tested.
- b) Fourteen (14) WNV-positive mosquito pool identified.
- c) Results were communicated to Environmental Health and subsequently released to the public.

8. Gonococcal Isolation Surveillance Program (GISP/eGISP)

In September, SNPHL collected 29 clinical isolates:

- a) Neisseria gonorrhoeae: ten (10) isolates
- b) Neisseria meningitidis: one (1) isolate

These will be sent to regional labs or the CDC for antimicrobial susceptibility testing (AST). Remnant NAATs or *N. gonorrhoeae* samples will be submitted to the CDC for molecular-based AST under eGISP Part B.

9. C. auris PCR Screening

SNPHL performed 1,117 Real-Time PCR screenings for Candida auris in September 2025.

D. <u>All-Hazards Preparedness:</u> Key Activities:

1. Coordination with First Responder Training

SNPHL collaborates on training and exercises with first responder agencies including the Civil Support Team, HazMat units, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), and the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department.

2. Laboratory Packaging and Shipping Guidance

SNPHL offers guidance to local laboratorians on CDC protocols for packaging and shipping infectious substances, including chain of custody procedures.

3. Onsite Training for Long-Term Care Facilities

SNPHL provided onsite training for long-term care facilities on the use of COVID-19 online ordering applications.

4. Monkeypox Biosafety Guidance

Biosafety guidance was supplied to sentinel sites in response to Monkeypox surveillance and containment efforts.

5. Vaccination Support for Laboratory Staff

SNPHL facilitated Monkeypox and bivalent COVID-19 booster vaccinations for laboratory personnel.

6. Ongoing Biosafety Training for SNPHL Staff

The laboratory continues to provide perpetual biosafety training and updated guidance to SNPHL personnel.

7. Training After Equipment Upgrade

SNPHL will provide training for all BSL-3 staff after installing the double door autoclave and fixing the leaking problem in September 2025.

The Safety Officer provided refresher training to the SNPHL security and hazard material storage for SNPHL members and completed in September 2025.

E. <u>September 2025 SNPHL Activity Highlights:</u> - Key Updates:

1. COVID-19 Testing Supplies and Reagent Forecast

SNPHL has maintained a consistent supply of Viral Transport Medium (VTM) for COVID-19 collection kits, even following the cessation of ELC COVID funding. However, reagents for PCR and Whole Genome Sequencing (WGS) are projected to be depleted by October 2025.

2. Proficiency Testing Performance

SNPHL achieved 100% proficiency across a wide range of tests, including:

- a) CAP G-B 2025 Syphilis Serology
- b) CAP GIP-B 2025 GI BioFire Gastrointestinal Panel 3
- c) CAP AHIV-B 20245

3. Facility Infrastructure and Equipment Calibration

Phoenix Controls completed system integration adjustments for the installation of the onsite monitor computer and network connection on the 2nd floor. This enables facility staff and Sunbelt Control employees to manage and modify the airflow, pressure, and temperature remotely or onsite.

4. Genomic Surveillance – SARS-CoV-2

WGS and genomic data analysis indicate that the Omicron variant XFG lineage was the dominant strain among samples received in September. SNPHL will continue sequencing close-contact samples to support ongoing investigations by the Office of Disease Surveillance (ODS).

5. Influenza Surveillance

Early data from the new influenza season show that A/H3, A/H1, and B/Victoria are the predominant subtypes of influenza.

6. Avian Influenza Surveillance

SNPHL participates in the CDC's Avian Influenza Surveillance Project by distributing testing guidance and specimen collection procedures to local hospitals via the Health Alert Network (HAN). Any ICU patients testing positive for Influenza A are required to submit specimens for subtyping to rule out avian influenza. No suspect avian flu samples were received in September.

7. Facility Expansion Planning

Phase I of the new facility design may focus on constructing BSL-3 and microbiology laboratories on the second floor, with a semi-shell layout planned for the first floor.

8. Expanded Clinical Testing Services

New test offerings in clinical chemistry, hematology, and urinalysis have formally opened for service for FQHC and DPP division. The SNPHL website of test menu has been updated and added those new additional tests.

9. Tuberculosis Testing

Tuberculosis (TB) samples that were collected from the Outbreak Investigation of the Catholic Charities has been completed on September 17th. A total # of 37 positives from 222 TB samples tested.

10. Additional Testing

The CMS CLIA waiver certificate for the Decatur laboratory has been renewed. The updated expiration date for this certificate is October 12, 2027.


September Highlights - Administrative




Access



Behavioral Health Services

- A. The Behavioral Health Manager presented on recognizing and responding to onsite mental health crises to 150+ Nevada HAND employees.
- B. SNCHC Behavioral Health team provided training on provider burnout to Clark County's Ryan White APG Meeting (Action Planning Group).
- C. SNCHC's Fremont team handed out 85 boxes of naloxone to the public during Save A Life Day event.

Family Planning Services

- A. Family Planning program access was up 13% in September and is up 7% year-over-year. Program team administrators and clinical staff have been working on a quality improvement project to increase access to care by simplifying the scheduling process and reducing waste in the appointment templates. Standardized metrics are being used to track the percentage of appointments scheduled per provider per day, appointment no-show rates, and the third next available appointment (TNAA) for new and established appointment types. The data is being used to fine tuning to the appointment schedules. The goal is to implement new, streamlined and standardized appointment templates in January 2026.
- B. SNCHC received the final report from its comprehensive Title X audit conducted last month. The report



- indicates that the health center was compliant with 82/85 criteria. The areas of find include adding language to program forms indicating the document was created with support of Title X funding and updates to the health center's sliding fee discount policy and procedure.
- C. The health center received notification that its request for a no-cost carry over of Title X funds from the previous budget year was approved. These funds will be used to further support the provision of high quality, low-cost family planning services.

HIV / Ryan White Care Program Services

- A. The Ryan White program received 52 referrals between September 1st and September 30th. There was one (1) pediatric client referred to the Medical Case Management in September, and the program received one (1) referral for pregnant women living with HIV during this time.
- B. There were 638 service encounters provided by the Ryan White Linkage Coordinator, Eligibility Worker, Care Coordinators, Nurse Case Managers, Community Health Workers, and Health Educator. There were 313 unique clients served under these programs in September.
- C. The Ryan White ambulatory clinic provided a total of 481 visits in the month of September, including 21 initial provider visits, 214 established provider visits including seven (7) tele-visits to established patients. Additionally, there were 16 nursing visits and 230 lab visits provided. There were 39 Ryan White services provided under Behavioral Health by licensed mental health practitioners and the Psychiatric APRN during the month of September. There were 18 Ryan White clients seen by the Registered Dietitian under Medical Nutrition services in September.
- D. The Ryan White clinic provides Rapid StART services, with a goal of rapid treatment initiation for newly diagnosed patients with HIV. The program continues to receive referrals and accommodate clients on a walk-in basis. There were six (6) patients seen under the Rapid StART Program in September.

FQHC-Sexual Health Clinic (SHC)

- A. The Sexual Health Clinic (SHC) clinic provided 1,118 unique services to 768 unduplicated patients for the month of September. There are currently more than 100 patients receiving injectable treatment for HIV prevention (PrEP).
- B. The SHC continues to collaborate with UMC on referrals for evaluation and treatment of neurosyphilis. The SHC is collaborating with the PPC Sexual Health and Outreach Prevention Programs (SHOPP) on the Gilead FOCUS grant to expand express testing services for asymptomatic patients and provide linkage to care for patients needing STI, Hepatitis C or HIV treatment services. The SHC continues to refer pregnant patients with syphilis and patients needing complex STI evaluation and treatment to PPC SHOPP for nurse case management services.
- C. One (1) SHC staff attended Naloxone training and received a presentation from American Heart Association.

Refugee Health Program (RHP)

There were no services provided to clients in the Refugee Health Program for the month of September 2025.




Southern Nevada Community Health Center Patient Satisfaction Survey – September 2025

5. Non-communicable Reports and Updates

a. Naloxone Training: SNHD is training and distributing naloxone (Narcan®) to first responders and members of key community sectors throughout Nevada to better respond to the large-scale burden of opioid overdoses. Funding from SAMHSA's First Responders-Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (FR-CARA), SAMHSA's State Opioid Response (SOR) via sub-awards from the University of Nevada Reno's Center for the Application of Substance Abuse Technologies, BJA's Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Use Program (COSSUP), and the CDC's Overdose Data to Action (OD2A) program has been instrumental. ODS has implemented a policy for SNHD staff to carry and administer Naloxone. ODS has also been given permission at the Clark County Detention Center to place Naloxone in a person's property at the facility.

6. Prevention - Community Outreach/Provider Outreach/Education

- a. Ongoing promotion continues of the Collect2Protect (C2P) program, an online service for those requesting testing for gonorrhea, chlamydia, and at-home HIV test kits. The C2P program allows users to order an at-home HIV test kit conveniently and privately, at no cost and get their results at home. Test kits for chlamydia and gonorrhea are also available for a fee. Express Testing will also be available at SNHD's main public health center, 280 S. Decatur Blvd., Las Vegas, for those who are asymptomatic and would like to get tested and know their HIV status. ODS continues to work with OOC to help promote C2P on SNHD web sites, social media and with the help of community partners. The Center, Sagebrush Health, and AHF continue to offer ongoing HIV/STD, PrEP/PEP, and rapid stART services to the community. Free HIV testing is also available from 8 a.m. 4:30 p.m. at the Southern Nevada Health District, 280 S. Decatur Blvd., Las Vegas, NV 89107 through the Express Testing/Annex A clinic.
- b. ODS continues to collaborate with community partners to participate at various outreach events. Our continued collaboration and presence at events in the community is key to gaining community trust and to help destigmatize HIV/STI testing which is vital to ending the HIV epidemic. We are very excited to be fully reengaged in HIV prevention outreach services. This month ODS wishes to highlight two of many outreach events held. We had our first outreach with our new community partner, the McDonalds located at 3010 N. Las Vegas Blvd, next to the Broadacres Marketplace (swap meet). As ODS strives to expand our reach to populations with high disease burden, having broader access points in the community are integral. We provided our full service offering of rapid HIV and HCV testing, syphilis testing, overdose prevention services, PrEP navigation, condoms, and educational/informational navigation. In our continued collaboration with the City of North Las Vegas we attended their "Sensational September" Pop-Up in Tonopah Park (204 E. Tonopah Ave.) on September 24th. This event brings a broad array of community services to the unhoused population in North Las Vegas. We provided syphilis testing, rapid HCV testing, overdose prevention services, PrEP navigation, condoms, and educational/ informational navigation.
- c. Distribution is ongoing TB Surveillance developed a laminated flyer titled "Is it TB?" The content includes messaging that encourages providers to "think TB" when talking to their patients about their risks and symptoms. 1. Enforcement Actions and Investigations:

- A. Laos Thai Street Food, 860 E. Twain Ave.: On September 2, the facility was closed for an Imminent Health Hazard (IHH), pest infestation. The inspector documented 33 demerits. The operator is required to attend a managerial conference on October 1. The facility was reinspected and reopened with three demerits on September 8.
- **B.** Panaderia La Asuncion Bakery, 1458 E. Charleston Blvd.: During a scheduled reinspection of a C grade on September 3, the facility was closed for exceeding the allowable 10 demerits on a reinspection. The inspector documented 30 demerits.

- **C.** Tacos Tijuana at Broadacres, 2930 N. Las Vegas Blvd.: On September 5, the facility was closed for an IHH, lack of adequate refrigeration. The inspector documented eight demerits. The facility never reopened; Broadacres management permanently closed their space.
- **D.** Camilla's Mexican Food, 5560 E. Lake Mead Blvd.: On September 9, the facility was closed due to an inspection that resulted in more than 40 demerits. The inspector documented 49 demerits. The facility was reinspected and reopened with zero demerits on September 11.
- **E. Donut Hut, 3242 Desert Inn Rd.:** During a complaint investigation on September 9, staff identified an unpermitted change of ownership, and the facility was closed for exceeding the 15 demerits allowed. The inspector documented 26 demerits. The facility remains closed at this time but has submitted their paperwork to Plan Review and is scheduled for a permitting inspection on September 29.
- **F.** Sabor Latino, 1305 Vegas Valley Dr.: On September 9, the facility was closed for an IHH, pest infestation. The inspector documented 12 demerits. The facility was reinspected and reopened with zero demerits on September 11.
- **G.** The Court Cafe, 1040 E. Flamingo Rd.: On September 10, the facility was closed for an IHH, pest infestation. The inspector documented 20 demerits. The facility was reinspected and reopened with zero demerits on September 12.
- H. Madrina's Kitchen, 2121 E. Sahara Ave.: On September 17, the facility was closed for an IHH, sewage or liquid waste not disposed of in an approved manner. The inspector documented five demerits. The facility was reinspected and reopened with zero demerits on September 30.
- **I.** The Beast, 1935 Fremont St.: On September 18, the facility was closed for an IHH, no potable or hot water. The inspector documented 24 demerits. The facility was reinspected and reopened with zero demerits on September 19.
- **J.** Superior Grocers, 390 S. Decatur Blvd.: On September 23, staff destroyed 400 pouches of El Jalisciense drink pouches that were for sale in the market due to being produced without a health permit.
- K. La Favorita Market, 1000 N. Rancho Dr.: On September 24, staff destroyed 310 pouches of El Jalisciense drink pouches that were for sale in the market due to being produced without a health permit.
- L. Penalty Box's Restaurant, 4300 E. Sunset Rd.: On September 25, the facility was closed for failing to pay a past due invoice within five days of the notice. The facility remains closed at this time.
- M. Vida Kitchens Commissary, 1370 W. Cheyenne Ave.: On September 26, the facility was closed for multiple IHHs, lack of adequate refrigeration and pest infestation. The inspector documented 14 demerits. A reinspection requested that afternoon failed due to continued pest infestation. The facility was reinspected and reopened with zero demerits on September 29.
- **N.** Los Tacos, 1710 E. Charleston Blvd.: During a scheduled red tag removal survey on September 30, the facility was closed for an IHH, lack of adequate refrigeration (all refrigeration at 49°F-51°F). The inspector documented eight demerits. The facility was reinspected and reopened with zero demerits on October 1.
- **O.** Staff closed 11 unpermitted food vending complaint investigations.

4. Legionella Response:

- **A.** Residential Legionella investigations began in January 2020 as part of a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) grant-funded project. A residential investigation is prompted by a resident becoming ill and the investigation is conducted in their home.
- **B.** Travel-associated investigations are prompted by a visitor who became ill after staying at a permitted public accommodation. An investigation is conducted at the hotel(s) they stayed at while in town.

5. Foodborne Illness Response:

- A. Estiatorio Milos, 3355 S. Las Vegas Blvd.: On September 3, staff responded to a confirmed case of vibrio. Source information for shellfish was collected to assist in conducting traceback investigations.
- **B.** Camilla's Mexican Food, 1490 E. Quartz Ave.: On September 9, staff responded to multiple reports of illness. Staff observed risk factors that could lead to illness, including improper handwashing, cross contamination from raw foods, refrigeration in disrepair, and unavailable sanitizer for food contact surfaces. The facility was closed due to excessive food safety violations that may endanger public health. The facility was reinspected and passed with an A grade.
- C. Marash Ice Cream, 3615 S. Las Vegas Blvd.: On September 9, staff responded to multiple reports of illness. Staff observed risk factors that could lead to illness, including food held at improper temperatures, improper handwashing practices, and refrigeration in disrepair. The inspection resulted in a B downgrade. The facility was reinspected and passed with an A grade.
- **D. PF Changs, 1095 S. Rampart Blvd.:** On September 10, staff responded to a confirmed case of campylobacter. Staff observed risk factors that could lead to illness, including improper handwashing practices and cross contamination between raw meats. The inspection resulted in a B downgrade. The facility was reinspected and passed with an A grade.
- **E. Peru Chicken, 2319 S. Eastern Ave.:** On September 17, staff responded to a confirmed case of shigella. Staff observed risk factors that could lead to illness, including improper handwashing practices and foods held at improper temperatures. The inspection resulted in a B downgrade. The facility was reinspected and passed with an A grade.
- **F. Rika Arepa Express, 3650 E. Flamingo Rd.:** On September 18, staff responded to a confirmed case of campylobacter. Staff observed risk factors that could lead to illness including improper handwashing practices, foods held at improper

- temperatures, and improper storage of foods. The inspection resulted in a C downgrade. A reinspection is still pending.
- **G. Piero's, 355 Convention Center Dr.:** On September 24, staff responded to a confirmed case of foodborne illness associated with shellfish. No issues were observed. Staff checked shellfish storage and preparation, and source information was collected.
- **H. Buffalo Wild Wings, 617 Mall Ring Cir.:** On September 25, staff responded to multiple reports of illness. Staff observed risk factors that could lead to illness including improper handwashing practices and foods held at improper temperatures. The inspection resulted in a B downgrade. A reinspection is still pending.
- I. PF Changs, 6671 S. Las Vegas Blvd.: On September 29, staff responded to multiple reports of illness. Staff observed risk factors that could lead to illness, including improper handwashing practices and refrigeration in disrepair. The inspection resulted in a C downgrade. A reinspection is still pending.
- J. El Pollo Loco, 2505 E. Tropicana Ave.: On September 30, staff responded to a confirmed case of Shiga toxin-producing E. coli (STEC). Staff observed risk factors that could lead to illness, including improper handwashing practices and cross contamination from raw meats. The inspection resulted in an A grade.

1. Schools:

- A. Canyon Springs High School, 350 E. Alexander Rd.: Staff investigated a complaint alleging that there was a rodent infestation inside a portable classroom. Staff observed rat feces inside two portable classrooms. School administration moved the teachers and students in the affected classrooms to classrooms with no evidence of rodents. School administration reported that pest control services were scheduled to arrive later in the day to develop a plan of action. After the pest control operator surveyed the school, school administration reported that several mitigation strategies were put in place including cleaning and sanitizing the ceiling tiles, replacing the door sweeps on the portables, shampooing and disinfecting the carpets, and installing rodent bait stations with cameras to monitor rodent activity. Two weeks after the initial complaint investigation, there was no more evidence of an infestation, and the portables were approved for use.
- **B. St. Viator Parish School, 4246 S. Eastern Ave.:** During a routine inspection of the playground, staff observed caution tape wrapped around a portion of the play structure that needed repairs. Since the tape created an entanglement hazard, the playground was taken out of use, the caution tape was removed, and a board was secured to the access point that prevented students from reaching the hazardous area. The playground was reopened with a work order on file to repair the damaged part of the structure.
- C. Nevada Preparatory Charter School Kitchen, 1780 Betty Ln.: A routine inspection resulted in closure of the kitchen due to multiple IHHs. The school had discontinued its contracted meal service provider and was pending a new contract. In the interim, school staff had been preparing meals in their homes and serving the food to students for lunch. SNHD Regulations does not allow food prepared in private homes to be served in permitted food establishments. Additionally, unwholesome foods were present; time/temperature control for safety (TCS) foods were being held at unsafe temperatures; cooking/refrigeration equipment were not being utilized as designed; sanitizer solution was above the concentration range specified by the manufacturer; food handlers did not have valid SNHD food handler safety training

cards; and open food and drinks belonging to employees were stored next to food for the students. School administration was instructed to obtain food from permitted establishments and ordered pizza for lunch service. A reinspection conducted the following week resulted in an A grade with stipulations for shelf stable, prepackaged food service until the new meal service contractor is approved by SNHD staff. The school administrator is required to attend a supervisory conference to review requirements.

2. Child Care:

A. Desert Torah Academy Preschool, 1312 Vista Dr.: During a routine inspection, staff observed multiple violations that resulted in a noncompliant inspection. Violations included failure to follow the two-step cleaning process; playground equipment in disrepair; physical hazards accessible to children; no hot water provided at classroom handwashing sinks; and no thermometer or temperature log provided inside the infant refrigerator. A reinspection is still pending.

3. Body Art:

- A. Clowny Tattoos-Piercing, 4090 W. Craig Rd.: During a routine inspection, staff observed multiple violations. Sterilizer spore tests were not available; class V indicator strips were not being used; and sterilization logs for 2025 were not being maintained. Spore tests, indicator strips, and logs are required to verify proper operation of the sterilizer. The sterilizer was taken out-of-service until a current passing spore test is provided, and the facility is prohibited from performing piercings unless using disposable instruments.
- **B.** Bareface Ink Golden Touch, 7080 S. Jones Blvd.: During a reinspection, staff observed multiple violations that resulted in a noncompliant inspection. An artist was actively performing a body art procedure on a patron who had not filled out a consent form; previously completed consent forms were missing required information; the hand sink was not adequately stocked; and biohazardous waste disposal records from the past three years were missing. A reinspection is still pending.
- C. Las Vegas Tattoo Studios, 1955 E. Tropicana Ave.: Staff investigated two complaints. The first complaint alleged that apprentices started their training prior to obtaining their apprenticeship card. The investigation found that apprentices are hired but not allowed to do body art work on customers during a short evaluation period. If the employee is a good fit for the company, then the employee must obtain their apprenticeship card before they can perform body art procedures. The complaint was not substantiated at the time of the investigation. The second complaint alleged that a tattoo became infected and that the artist who performed the procedure did not have a valid body art card. The owner of the facility reported that they were not aware of any infections. A survey of the workstation found that all surfaces were non-porous and in good condition. The station had a sharps container, disinfectant, and a stocked and accessible handwashing sink. All equipment was stored in a clean manner and had current sterilization dates. The applicable artist held an apprentice card that indicated more than six months of experience. Staff instructed the artist to obtain their body art card and will follow up to ensure that the process is completed. The complaint was valid.
- D. Las Vegas Tattoo Festival, 475 Grand Central Pkwy.: Staff conducted 136 body art inspections at this special event. Minor violations observed included expired ink and ink that was missing the lot number and expiration date. All ink that was not in compliance was voluntarily discarded. The vast majority of the inspections were completed on the first day of the event. The remaining artists were inspected the following day. A new card system to indicate successful completion of the inspection

was implemented which streamlined the process for both the artists and SNHD staff working at the event.

1. Enforcement Actions and Investigations:

- A. Milestone Academy Southern Highlands, 11350 Southern Highlands Pkwy.: A remodel inspection for a new climbing wall failed because it was installed within two feet of an overhead shade canopy. The proximity to the canopy created an unsafe condition because children could potentially climb onto it. Playground areas must be designed to prevent access to non-play structures that pose fall hazards. A reinspection is still pending.
- **B. Viareggio Italian, 4275 S. Durango Dr.:** During a change of permit holder (CPH) inspection, staff could not approve the bar permit due to a lack of ware washing equipment, inadequate refrigeration, and no functional hand sink. Food facilities must meet all minimum equipment requirements prior to permitting approval. A reinspection is still pending.
- C. Butterface Breakfast, 6115 S. Fort Apache Rd.: A final permitting inspection of the bar failed due to incomplete installation and construction. None of the equipment had been plumbed, ware washing equipment was not functional, and a hand sink was not available. All construction and installation must be complete and meet all SNHD minimum equipment requirements prior to permitting approval. After reinspection, the health permit was approved.
- D. Astra Cafe, 3225 S. Rainbow Blvd.: A CPH inspection failed due to multiple violations, including nonfunctional refrigeration; unsafe food temperatures; incorrect cooling methods; odors from an unmaintained grease capture unit; and a food handler without a valid card. Per SNHD Regulations, a health permit cannot be issued for a CPH when violations result in more than 15 demerits. The inspector documented 24 demerits, so the facility was closed. The health permit was approved after violations were corrected and a reinspection resulted in six demerits.
- E. Boa Steakhouse at Grand Canal Palazzo, 3227 S. Las Vegas Blvd.: During a final permitting inspection, staff observed missing ceiling tiles; broken wall tiles with gaps; an unsealed pipe penetration; broken light shields; inadequate lighting under the hood and over chef counters; and a nonfunctional refrigerated chef counter. A refrigeration technician was present and conducting repairs. SNHD Regulations require sealing all gaps to prevent pest entry, maintaining functional lighting, and ensuring refrigeration can maintain foods at 41°F. A vacuum sealer was also not approved for use because use of the sealer requires a Hazard Analysis Critical

- Control Point (HACCP) plan review approval. Staff referred the operator to the SNHD Special Processes/HACCP team for approval requirements. The health permit was approved with conditions.
- F. Tony's Pizzeria, 725 S. Las Vegas Blvd.: A final permitting inspection resulted in failure due to no hot water at the only handwashing sink. SNHD Regulations require a minimum of 100°F hot water at all hand sinks. The hot water supply line had been cut. After repairs, a reinspection was completed, and the health permit was approved.
- G. 777 Gaming and Spirits Bar, 2333 N. Jones Blvd.: A final permitting inspection resulted in failure due to multiple violations. The facility was still under active construction; a glass washer was inoperable; black liquid was pooled in the bottom of the ice machine bin; sanitizer, test strips, and stem thermometer were absent; and equipment was leaking. Following corrections, a reinspection was completed, and the health permit was approved.
- H. Vegas Vista Academy, 4660 N. Rancho Dr.: During a CPH inspection, staff observed an entanglement hazard on the playground. A hose on the misting system was dangling above raised playground equipment and was within reach of the students. A maintenance person was called to secure the hose above the students' reach. The hazard was corrected, and the CPH was approved.
- I. Civica Career and Collegiate Academy Kitchen, 1201 E. Carey Ave.: During a final permitting inspection, staff noticed a gap under the exterior door of the kitchen. The general contractor was instructed to install a door sweep on the door to seal the gap. SNHD Regulations require exterior openings to be sealed to prevent pest entry. The health permit was approved with the stipulation that the door sweep be installed within 10 days.
- J. Woodbury, Clare W. Jr. High School, 3875 E. Harmon Ave.: During a final permitting inspection, a kiln for the art room and an oven for the kitchen had not yet been installed. A follow-up inspection was conducted, and the new equipment was inspected and approved.

1. Aquatic Health Operations

A. Desert Club Resort, 3950 Koval Ln.: A routine inspection at the spa resulted in an IHH closure due to high pH. High pH interferes with the effectiveness of chlorine. Following corrections, a reinspection was conducted the same day, and the spa was approved to reopen.

- **B.** Heritage Pointe Apartments, 532 College Dr.: A routine inspection at the pool resulted in an IHH closure with multiple violations. The pool had high chlorine and a damaged drain cover. High chlorine concentrations can cause skin, eye, and lung irritation and a damaged drain cover poses an entrapment hazard and increases the risk of drowning. A reinspection is still pending.
- C. Pacific Willow Madera Apartments, 2600 S. Town Center Dr.: A routine inspection at the spa resulted in an IHH closure due to multiple violations. The spa had low chlorine, and the water temperature exceeded 104°F. Inadequate disinfection exposes bathers to pathogens that can make them sick and water temperature over 104°F can lead to dehydration, cardiovascular strain, and heat stroke. Following corrections, a reinspection was conducted the same day, and the spa was approved to reopen.
- D. Paradise Trails Mobile Home Park, 2485 W. Wigwam Ave.: A routine inspection at the spa resulted in an IHH closure with multiple violations. A gate did not self-close or self-latch, and the spa had high cyanuric acid and high chlorine. An improperly functioning gate poses a drowning risk by allowing unattended children access to the pool area and high cyanuric acid reduces the effectiveness of chlorine. A reinspection is still pending.
- E. Best Western Plus Las Vegas West, 8669 W. Sahara Ave.: A routine inspection at the spa resulted in an IHH closure due to high bromine. High bromine concentrations can cause skin, eye, and lung irritation. A reinspection is still pending.
- **F. Pacific Harbors Sunrise Apartments, 5150 E. Sahara Ave.:** A reinspection conducted at the pool as part of a Community Multi-Agency Response Team (CMART) action resulted in a written compliance schedule. The pool was management closed and drained at the time of the reinspection; however, standing water remained in the pool and equipment had been changed without a remodel permit. Standing water may become harborage for pests if not removed. A reinspection is still pending.
- **G. Tides on Wynn Apartments, 3800 Wynn Rd.:** Reinspections conducted at the pools as part of a CMART action resulted in written compliance schedules. The pools were management closed and drained at the time of the reinspections, but their main drain covers were damaged. Reinspections are still pending.
- H. The Croix Townhomes, 1281 Galleria Dr.: A routine inspection at the spa resulted in an IHH closure with multiple violations. The spa had high chlorine, and the water temperature exceeded 104°F. Following corrections, a reinspection was conducted the same day, and the spa was approved to reopen.
- I. Millennium East Apartments, 3580 E. Alexander Rd.: A routine inspection at the pool resulted in an IHH closure due to high chlorine. A reinspection is still pending.
- J. Westgate Hotel and Casino, 3000 S. Paradise Rd.: A routine inspection at the pool resulted in an IHH closure due to a damaged drain cover. Following corrections, a reinspection was conducted the same day, and the pool was approved to reopen.
- K. Tides on Twain Apartments, 4455 E. Twain Ave.: A routine inspection at the pool resulted in an IHH closure due to multiple violations. The pool had a damaged drain cover, high chlorine, and high cyanuric acid. A reinspection is still pending.
- L. Valencia Apartments, 1455 E. Katie Ave.: A routine inspection at the pool resulted in an IHH closure due to low chlorine. Following corrections, a reinspection was conducted the same day, and the pool was approved to reopen.
- M. Skye Canyon Park, 10115 W. Skye Canyon Park Dr.: A routine inspection at the spa resulted in an IHH closure due to a damaged drain cover. A reinspection is still pending.

2. Aquatic Health Plan Review:

- A. Avion at Sunrise Mountain, 6901 E. Lake Mead Blvd.: A plumbing inspection for the spa resulted in failure due to incorrect suction outlet fitting assembly (SOFA) plumbing, which can result in suction entrapment. A reinspection is still pending.
- **B.** Silver Springs, 1951 Silver Springs Pkwy.: A plan review was conducted for a skimmer remodel. The originally proposed skimmers did not meet the required flow rate for the system, which could lead to improper filtration of the pool. A revised application was submitted and approved.
- **C. Snug Harbor Apartments, 2780 E. Flamingo Rd.:** A plumbing inspection was not approved due to incorrect SOFA plumbing. A reinspection is still pending.
- D. Sunrise Bay Homeowner's Association, 2110 Los Feliz St.: A waiver application to allow a single, blockable SOFA configuration with an additional safety device installed was not approved as it did not adequately identify the risk associated with waiving the regulatory requirement. Once the required information was provided, the waiver was approved.

The Public Health and Preventive Care (PPC) Division is dedicated to protecting and promoting the health of our community. Through a range of clinical services, programmatic initiatives, and community outreach efforts, PPC works to prevent disease, support wellness, and ensure access to essential health resources for all residents. Our goal is to create a healthier, more equitable community by addressing public health needs with care, collaboration, and evidence-based practices.

I. PPC Administrative Updates

A. The expanded use of the electronic health record system (eClinicalWorks) has improved patient access to online self-scheduling. The Project/Program Coordinator and the Administrative Analyst attended the eClinicalWorks / Healow National Conference in Orlando, FL.

II. Immunization Program

A. Immunization Program Activities

- 1. All Public Health Centers have started providing the flu vaccine to the public; however, there was a delay in state funded vaccines. State funded vaccines for flu were made available to the public the last week of September.
- 2. The 2025-2026 COVID-19 vaccine has been made available to clients with private and commercial insurance. All Public Health Centers are currently waiting to receive the COVID-19 state funded vaccines. The delay was a result of the state waiting for the ACIP recommendation 2025.
- 3. The RSV vaccine continues to be encouraged to all those who are eligible.
 - i. CDC recommends everyone 50-74 who are increased risk of severe RSV available at any time, but best time to get vaccinated in late summer and early fall.
 - ii. CDC recommends everyone ages 75 years and older get the RSV vaccine available at any time, but best time to get vaccinated in late summer and early fall.
 - iii. CDC recommends all infants whose mother did not receive RSV vaccine during pregnancy, and some children ages 8-19 months who are at increased risk for severe RSV October through March.
 - iv. CDC recommends all pregnant women during weeks 32 weeks and 36 weeks and 6 days of their pregnancy September through January.

B. Immunization Outreach Activities

1. Immunization outreach clinics in September- seven clinics, 227 vaccines were administered to 104 clients. The clinics were held at CCSD Family Support Center, Cimarron High School, 3 Homeless outreaches and at the Mexican Consulate.

III. Community Health Nursing

A. Maternal Child Health

There were no referrals for newborn screenings or lead in the month of September. There were 8 active clients enrolled in the lead case management program. The MCH nurse continues to complete joint home visits to enrolled Healthy Start participants and assists with immunization outreach events. In addition, she provided nursing support during a TB testing event at Catholic Charities.

B. Nurse Family Partnership (NFP)

The Southern Nevada Health District Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) is an evidence-based nurse home visiting program that provides services to pregnant first-time mothers. In September, SNHD's NFP program had 149 families enrolled in the program. Of the 149 enrolled families, 67 families participated in the Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program, a grant from the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health.

In September, the nurse home visitors completed 163 in person home visits where they provided education, support, and resources to help improve pregnancy outcomes, child growth and development and self-sufficiency of the families.

C. Healthy Start Initiative- Enhanced

The Southern Nevada Health District's Healthy Start Initiative Program is supported by the Health Resources and Service Administration (HRSA) of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). There was a total of eighty-four families served through September 2025. In-person program outreach was conducted at the City of Las Vegas Mom's Resource Fair, West Charleston Library's Be Well Fun Fair, UNLV School of Public Health Open House, East Las Vegas Community Center, Family Promise of Las Vegas, Open House, the Eighth Judicial District Court's Health and Benefits Fair, and Las Vegas Leading Ladies Community Health Resource Fair and Food Bank. Program outreach was also completed at nine Department of Welfare and Supportive Service locations.

The Program Manager and Consortium Coordinator attended the CityMatCH Maternal and Child Health Leadership Conference in St. Louis, Missouri and the Healthy Start Grantee Meeting in Arlington, Virginia.

D. Embracing Fatherhood

The Embracing Fatherhood of Southern Nevada program currently has 15 active clients. The community health worker continues to enroll new clients to provide education, support and resources during home visits with the overall goals of strengthening families and improving child health outcomes.

IV. Sexual Health Outreach and Prevention Program (SHOPP)

- A. Express Testing (ET) is a program that conducts testing for sexually transmitted infections (STI's) without a provider exam for asymptomatic patients. ET provided 205 screening encounters for the month of September.
- B. The Congenital Syphilis Case Management Program (CSCMP) is a program to address the high rate of congenital syphilis in the community. The CSCMP nurses, in coordination with perinatal Hep B and HIV programs, continue to meet monthly to plan future targeted education sessions to increase knowledge and awareness of these diseases and available resources. The team continues to serve 40 active clients and completed 6 academic and educational community events.
- C. SHOPP houses Complex STI navigation services including Neurosyphilis Emergent Onsite Navigation (NEON) program which aims to provide critical linkage services to patients suspected of neurosyphilis. Three NEON referrals were received, and three clients were navigated.

- E. The SHOPP *Rapid PREVENT* program has a total of 13 enrolled clients. CHW's for this initiative work collaboratively with Express Testing to assess and provide linkage to care services and community resources.
- F. SHOPP's Pathways to Better Health (PBH) program serves pregnant/postpartum mothers and follows until the infant turns one year of age. The Community Health Workers support, educate and provide linkages and referrals with the goal of improving health outcomes during and after pregnancy for both moms and babies. This program now has a total of 32 active clients.

V. Street Medicine (SM) – Introduction of New Program

A. Program Launch & Staffing

The new Street and Medicine program was launched to deliver essential primary care services directly to unhoused individuals—meeting them where they are, in line with the recognized philosophy of street medicine: going to the people and centering their needs. A Senior Community Health Nurse has been hired and is currently undergoing orientation. An Advance Practice Registered Nurse (APRN) started on the last week of this month and has begun onboarding activities. A nurse supervisor will be partially overseeing the program and nursing activities.

B. Community Engagement & Collaboration

The program was introduced at the recent Continuum of Care meeting, bringing together organizations that serve unhoused populations. In partnership with the Office of Disease Surveillance, a series of community listening sessions were conducted this month to add to the baseline landscape assessment. These sessions aim to amplify community voices in program planning, enhance coordination with existing services, and avoid duplicating efforts.

C. Approach & Intent

This primary care initiative embraces a harm-reduction and trauma-informed care model—focused on building trust through consistent outreach, nonjudgmental engagement, and accountability in meeting patients where they are. Community partnerships will play an instrumental role in both piloting and scaling the program effectively.

D. Statistical report on program activities will be added to BOH reports later in the year.

V. Tuberculosis (TB) Clinic

TB clinic has one (1) new adult TB active cases and zero (0) pediatric cases for the month of September 2025.

VI. Employee Health Nursing – September 2025

- A. There were five (5) SNHD employees who tested positive for COVID-19. Zero (0) PCR tests were conducted.
- B. Employee New Hire and Annual Tuberculosis (TB) testing continues, and annual catch-up TB testing is ongoing. Fourteen (14) Tuberculosis tests were completed.
- C. Employee New Hire and Annual FIT Testing Medical Evaluations continue. Seventeen (17) medical clearances were completed.

- D. Vaccine Clinics
 - 1. September 1 September 30, 2025
 - 2. Employees Total: 6 employees
 - a) 1 COVID-19 Updated booster.
 - b) 4 Influenza Vaccine
 - c) 0 Monkeypox Vaccine
 - d) 4 other vaccines
 - e) 0 Hepatitis B vaccines- Immz Policy
 - 3. Total Vaccines Given: 9
- E. New Hire/Onboarding: Four (4) new hires were onboarded.
- F. Employee Health Nurse Accomplishments:
 - 1. Flu and COVID 19 clinics were held for employees wishing to have their vaccinations in-house. The District strongly encourages all eligible employees to get vaccinated to protect their health, their coworkers, and the community they serve.
- G. Policies and procedures continue to be reviewed and updated.

Dear Members of the Southern Nevada Health District Board of Health:

I am writing as a Clark County resident directly impacted by the proposed 2025 Regulations Governing Individual Sewage Disposal Systems (ISDS) and Liquid Waste Management to formally oppose their adoption. These regulations raise profound concerns regarding their legality under state and federal constitutions, adherence to due process requirements, and respect for individual rights and property protections. As a homeowner relying on an existing septic system, I urge the Board to reject these proposals in their current form to safeguard constitutional principles and prevent undue harm to rural communities.

Constitutional and Legal Concerns:

The proposed regulations appear to infringe upon fundamental constitutional protections, particularly those enshrined in the Nevada Constitution and the U.S. Constitution's Takings Clause. Specifically, the imposition of a \$226 five-year operating permit fee for all ISDS replacing the current lifetime permits—constitutes a revenue-generating measure that "creates, generates, or increases public revenue." Under the Nevada Supreme Court's ruling in Legislature of the State of Nevada v. Settelmeyer (137 Nev. Adv. Op. 21, 2021), such measures require a two-thirds supermajority vote in both houses of the Nevada Legislature. SNHD's attempt to enact this fee through administrative rulemaking, without explicit legislative authorization passed by the requisite supermajority, exceeds its delegated authority and violates Article 4, Section 18(2) of the Nevada Constitution.

Furthermore, the U.S. Supreme Court's unanimous decision in Sheetz v. County of El Dorado (601 U.S. , 2024) mandates that permit conditions, including fees, imposed by legislative or administrative bodies must satisfy the Takings Clause under the Fifth Amendment. This requires an "essential nexus" between the fee and a legitimate government interest, as well as "rough proportionality" to the specific impact of the individual property. The blanket \$226 fee, applied uniformly to all septic system owners without individualized assessments of environmental impact, health risks, or system performance, fails this constitutional test. It risks constituting an uncompensated taking of property by arbitrarily burdening homeowners' rights to use and enjoy their land without tailored justification.

These legal flaws underscore a broader issue of regulatory overreach, potentially exposing SNHD to litigation and undermining public trust in government actions that must prioritize the protection of individual property rights.

Lack of Scientific Justification and Necessity:

SNHD has not presented sufficient evidence-based rationale to support these sweeping changes, as required for regulations that infringe on property rights and impose new obligations. Absent from the proposal are:

- Empirical data on septic failure rates across Clark County, particularly in rural areas.
- Comprehensive environmental studies, such as groundwater nitrate contamination assessments using the Nevada Division of Environmental Protection (NDEP) Septic Density Model, demonstrating a county-wide public health crisis.
- Documented instances of public health threats directly attributable to existing ISDS that necessitate immediate, universal intervention.
- A rigorous cost-benefit analysis evaluating the administrative costs against the purported benefits, ensuring the regulations are the least restrictive means to achieve any legitimate goals.

Without such substantiation, the regulations appear arbitrary and disproportionate, violating principles of substantive due process under the Fourteenth Amendment by failing to rationally advance a compelling public interest while encroaching on individual liberties.

Financial Hardship and Impact on Individual Rights:

- The regulations disproportionately burden rural residents, including seniors on fixed incomes and long-term homeowners, by introducing recurring fees and potential mandatory upgrades (e.g., nitrogen removal systems in designated areas), threatening their right to retain and affordably maintain their properties.
- Requirements for septic tank pumping every 10 years, inspections upon property transfer, and possible sewer connections (if within 400 feet of a system) could impose costs ranging from \$40,000 to \$100,000 per household, effectively diminishing property values and forcing involuntary displacement.
- Many residents, including myself, acquired properties with permanent septic permits in reliance on existing rules, and these retroactive changes infringe on vested property rights, potentially amounting to a regulatory taking without just compensation.

Procedural Violations and Due Process Concerns:

The rulemaking process itself demonstrates significant due process deficiencies, depriving affected individuals of their Fourteenth Amendment rights to fair notice and meaningful opportunity to be heard. Numerous residents, particularly in remote rural areas, report receiving no direct notification from SNHD about these proposals, relying instead on sporadic media coverage or word-of-mouth. The compressed timeline— with public comments due by October 3, 2025, and the final hearing on October 23, 2025—affords insufficient time for thorough review, expert consultation, or coordinated community response. This lack of adequate outreach and engagement violates procedural due process standards, as established in cases like Mathews v. Eldridge (424 U.S. 319, 1976), which require balancing government interests against the risk of erroneous deprivation of private rights.

Requested Actions:

To rectify these issues and uphold legality, due process, and individual protections, I

respectfully urge the Board to:

- Postpone implementation indefinitely until the Nevada Legislature enacts enabling legislation with the constitutionally required two-thirds supermajority, explicitly authorizing the fees and requirements.
- Commission and publicly release independent scientific studies and a full cost-benefit
 analysis to justify any regulations, ensuring they are narrowly tailored to documented
 needs.
- Explore less burdensome alternatives, such as grandfathering existing systems, phased implementation schedules, hardship waivers for low-income households, and financial assistance programs to mitigate impacts on property rights.
- Extend the public comment period and conduct additional outreach, including direct mailings to all affected property owners, to guarantee meaningful participation and compliance with due process.

Conclusion:

These proposed regulations represent an unwarranted expansion of administrative authority that contravenes constitutional mandates, disregards due process, and erodes the fundamental rights of individuals to own, use, and protect their properties without arbitrary government interference. By prioritizing evidence-based governance and respect for legal safeguards, the Board can avoid imposing unjust burdens on Clark County residents. I implore you to reject the regulations as drafted and reconsider them in light of these critical concerns.

Thank you for your attention to this matter and for upholding the principles of fair and lawful administration.

My husband and I live in the section 11 neighborhood of Las Vegas. I am 77 years old, and he is 79 years old. The pending changes to the septic regulations will be the cherry on top of the financial hardship being perpetrated on long time locals who live in the older neighborhoods.

We purchased this home in 1990 and have spent the ensuing 35 years making it comfortable and attractive. Although the home was built in the early 1970's; it was never landscaped. We have spent all of our free time and 10's of thousands of dollars to make our half acre into our sanctuary. We do not employ "blow and go guys". WE are the laborers who have made financial sacrifices to ensure that we would be able to live here in our retirement.

Since the initiation in 2023 of the punitive water policies, we have struggled to maintain our property. With the proposed septic rules, uncertainty about our ability to stay here will be an added burden. It is not feasible for retired people on fixed incomes to pay \$40,000 to \$100,000 for a sewer hookup. We have consistently taken care to ensure that our septic system has been pumped and inspected. The last time was approximately 2 years ago and there is no need to abandon our working system that we maintain.

I attended the public meetings last week and it is clear that the potential ramifications of these new rules have not been properly considered and most certainly not communicated to residents. The poor staff who tried to defend the new rules made that abundantly clear.

Please REJECT the proposed 2025 ISDS/Liquid Waste regulations and START OVER with genuine public participation. This omnibus package hasn't been fully vetted with residents, yet it would impose forced or effectively mandated sewer hookups, recurring operating permits, transfer inspections/fees, and technology mandates in "sensitive" areas. Please REJECT the proposed 2025 ISDS/Liquid Waste regulations and START OVER with genuine public participation. This omnibus package hasn't been fully vetted with residents, yet it would impose forced or effectively mandated sewer hookups, recurring operating permits, transfer inspections/fees, and technology mandates in "sensitive" areas. If sewer conversion is a public goal, it must be publicly planned and funded—not billed to individual homeowners.

The mismanagement of our water sources by those that oversee it should not be our punishment to pay for. The water district and SNHD are targeting us we are a small group that the majority of households would not care about because this issue does not affect them.

In addition, these tactics would be similar to saying that every homeowner in southern Nevada should have to pay an inspection and permit fees to show that there sewer line from their house has no leaks prior to the public hookup in the street. How do we know that there aren't thousands of house main lines that have a leak underground before it reaches the public sewer line? Why don't all homeowners have to have their main drain line inspected every year....how do we know 100% of their used water is making it back into the public system if every house isn't being inspected. If the theory is that we have to make sure our systems are working or that it is important to capture our water being used, why doesn't this apply to every home in southern Nevada?

Dear Members of the Board,

I write to formally oppose the proposed policy to impose fees on septic-tank owners and/or to mandate the removal of septic systems with forced connection to municipal sewer systems at homeowners' expense. I strongly urge you to reconsider this proposal and adopt alternative approaches that respect property rights, fairness, and cost burdens.

My objections are as follows:

- 1. Unjust financial burden on homeowners Requiring owners who have long maintained septic systems to pay new fees or convert at their own cost is inequitable. Many of us installed septic systems because municipal sewer lines were not available at the time of construction. Imposing new costs now punishes homeowners retroactively.
- 2. Lack of evidentiary justification The stated rationale—water conservation or "return flow credits" to Lake Mead—is speculative in many cases and does not justify imposing heavy capital and ongoing costs on individual households, especially when alternatives (such as voluntary conversion or rebate programs) may suffice.
- 3. Disproportionate impact on rural / equestrian / well-dependent properties Many properties with septic systems also depend on wells or have large lots. Forcing them to tie into municipal systems risks undermining well use, increasing infrastructure conflicts, and creating burdens not anticipated at time of purchase.
- 4. Regulatory overreach and property rights concerns Mandating removal of a legally permitted and properly functioning septic system constitutes regulatory taking if the cost and burden are not justified by a compelling public health or safety need. Homeowners deserve fair process, transparency, and protections against arbitrary requirements.
- 5. Better alternatives exist If water conservation or return flow credits are real goals, these could be achieved with voluntary incentives, grants, rebates, or cost-sharing programs, rather than forced mandates. Indeed, SNWA already has a Septic to Sewer Conversion Program that offers to cover up to 85 percent of eligible costs (subject to funding limits) for willing participants. Also, legislative efforts to require forced conversions have already met strong public pushback, and proposed amendments seek to make conversion voluntary.

For the foregoing reasons, I respectfully request:

• That you withdraw or suspend the proposal to impose mandatory fees and forced conversions.

- That you instead adopt a voluntary, opt-in conversion program with generous cost sharing and safeguards.
- That you engage in a robust public outreach process, with opportunity for meaningful homeowner input, financial impact analysis, and appeals.
- That any regulation be limited to cases where a septic system is failing or causing a demonstrable health risk—not blanket mandates on all septic owners.

Please include this letter in the public record and notify me of any further meetings, hearings, or decisions on this matter. I would appreciate a written response explaining how the Board plans to address homeowners' concerns and protect fairness.

Thank you for your consideration. I trust you will act in a manner that is reasonable, transparent, and respectful to property owners.

I know many of our neighbors who routinely evacuate our septic tanks to ensure proper operation. I am particularly concerned about the following:

Section 2-2.01 (A). I already obtained a permit when I installed the system. If you want to impose such a NEW permitting process, then have it apply to new customers! Existing systems, originally permitted under your regulations, should only be subject to the <10-year pumping requirement.

Section 2-2.03. (D). I see no reason to extract money from mostly elderly home owners to fund this permitting process. It seems that simply sending a copy of the pumping receipt into the SNHD would be sufficient to ensure systems continue to operate properly.
