











Service Animals in Food Establishments

Service animals are dogs that are individually trained to work or perform tasks for people with disabilities.







- A properly trained service animal is not a pet. **Service animals are working animals.**
 - Dogs whose sole function is to provide comfort or emotional support
- do not qualify as service animals under Title II and III of the Americans with Disabilities Act.
 - **Service animals must be under control.** The animal must be harnessed,
- leashed, or tethered, unless these devices interfere with the service animal's work or the individual's disability prevents using these devices.
- Other species of animals, whether trained or untrained, are not considered service animals.
- Service animals are not to be fed as part of the dining experience.

Service animals are generally not allowed in grocery carts. They must be on the floor or carried by the handler.





Service animals are not allowed on dining tables or seats.
