VII. INFORMATIONAL ITEMS/ DISCUSSION ONLY

A. Legislative successes and future opportunities for HIV Prevention and Care: Senator Dallas Harris

- SB172 – passed in 2003; legislative allows minors access to healthcare in prevention of STIs.
- SB211 - passed in 2021; requires mandatory consultation and testing by providers and ERs to consult patients 15 years and up about testing for STIS. Testing is the key to help stop the spread of disease.
- SB325 - passed in 2023; allows pharmacists to be able to prescribe drugs such as PrEP

Discussion

- SB325- Per Nelis -the NV Legislature's site: An Act relating to health care; requiring the State Board of Pharmacy to prescribe a protocol authorizing a pharmacist to prescribe, dispense and administer drugs to prevent the acquisition of human immunodeficiency virus and perform certain laboratory tests; requiring certain health plans to include coverage for such drugs and testing; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.
 - Legislation on the requirements to have EMR and liability insurance prevents pharmacies from offering prep
 - Labs are required, the process takes time from regular pharmacist duties, and there's no extra incentive for pharmacists to take on this task with all the requirements that are set in place
 - The bill has great intentions, but implementation issues prevent pharmacists from carrying this out. NPI numbers are required to order labs because some lab does not recognize pharmacy NPI numbers and will not process the labs

Senator: Some of the barriers the state can control I am interested in addressing these barriers.

- SB-275- passed in 2021; reformed HIV criminalization laws reduce sentences based on testing and science and not stigma
- SB-439 - passed in 2023; is a follow up to SB-275 provisions related to healthcare and medications for all STD's. Drugs are on states list.

Discussion

- NRS 453B HIV aids drugs donation program, it was passed but not active for the state of Nevada
- Create shield laws for minors to access care so it doesn't show up on parent's insurance

Q: For the modernization law there's updated NRS in the state law but nothing in the NAC has been updated and there have not been updates. What is the delay?

A: The statutes override regulations. Rulemaking may be underway but just taking a long time once in statute that is the law.

Q: Expungement laws - Nevada doesn't have any expungement laws, only record sealing. Will we get expungement laws?

A: Nevada currently does not have the ability currently for expungement laws, only record sealing.

Q: PEP and PrEP in the pharmacies - reimbursing pharmacists for services: how can pharmacists adjust to do all these services and requirements along with regular paying services without billing? This type of service is not set up to bill and get paid. Is there an insurance Commission to adjust this?

A: There is an Insurance Commission; however, it is not for healthcare insurance, they cannot mandate reimbursements. I will see what can be done to allow the billing, maybe change codes like the ICD10. Maybe we can raise this issue with all stakeholder entities so all the challenges can be addressed at once.

Q: Is there a way to get STI prevention information to schools?

A: Maybe through sex education curriculum but amending sex education curriculum is very difficult. Perhaps go before the State Board of Education and/or the State Board of Health to raise the requirements of sex education within schools.

- On the cost of HIV medications, the federal government is working to cap the cost of medications. At the state level there might be some things we can do such as set up cost tracking sites so medications can be tracked to see cost trends. Regulators for cost of medications the pharmacy benefit legislatures capping doesn't always allow for full

reimbursement. There are also access issues to PEP and PrEP and yes, the cost of medications is too high and sometimes unknown.

D. Condom Distribution SNHD: Presentation Treva Palmer SNHD ODS

- 2023 – 213, 797 condoms provided: 33,000 packs of lube from July - November
- 2024 - 178,200 condoms provided: 41,700 packs of lube

- We're in the process of creating a new streamline distribution system so look for an e-mail to come soon

Q: Are non-latex condoms available?

A: Currently no but we will check into getting non-latex condoms.

Q: Will there be a push for a mail order condom service based off northern Nevada?

A: Currently no as budget is a deciding factor and we know northern Nevada had to discontinue the program due to funding.

Discussion: Medicaid will pay for condoms with a prescription. We can put information and packets that Medicaid will pay for the condoms we need to create a campaign to 1st educate the pharmacies and providers then we can educate the community. SNHD does provide condoms in our clinics. We should encourage community organizations to advise their in-house providers to write prescriptions for condoms, and let clients know to have their providers write prescriptions for condoms.

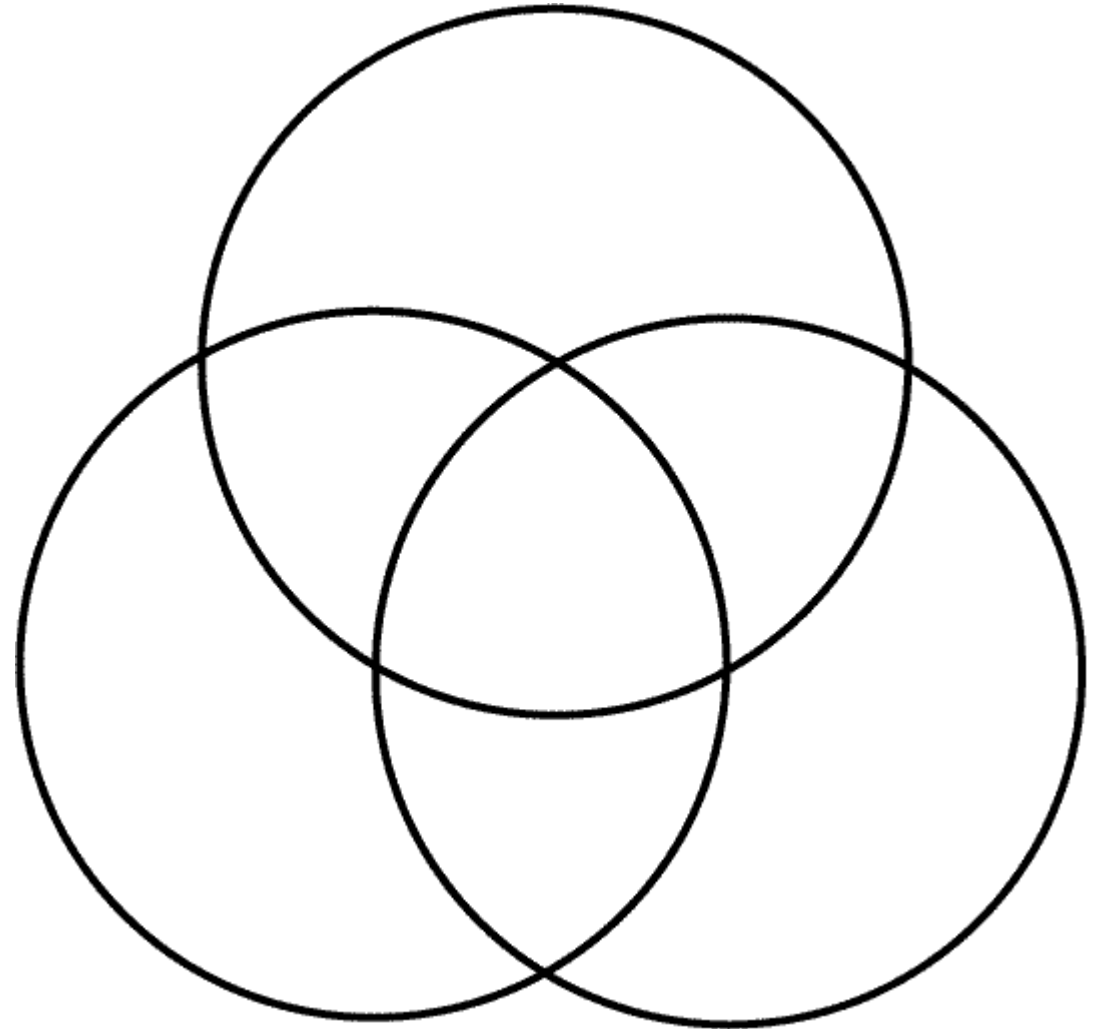
Victim/Survivor

Who Is Affected?

- **1 in 4 women** and **1 in 9 men** experience severe intimate partner physical violence in their lifetime
- Women between the ages of **18-34** experience the highest rates of abuse by an intimate partner

Who Is Most Affected?

- Women
- LGBTQ people
- People of color
- Indigenous women/girls
- Disabled people

DV/SA in LGBTQ Populations

- **44%** of lesbians and **61%** of bisexual women experience rape, physical violence, or stalking by an intimate partner
 - compared to **35%** of heterosexual women
- Between **25-50%** of gay and bisexual men report experiencing physical IPV– **12-30%** report sexual violence by a partner

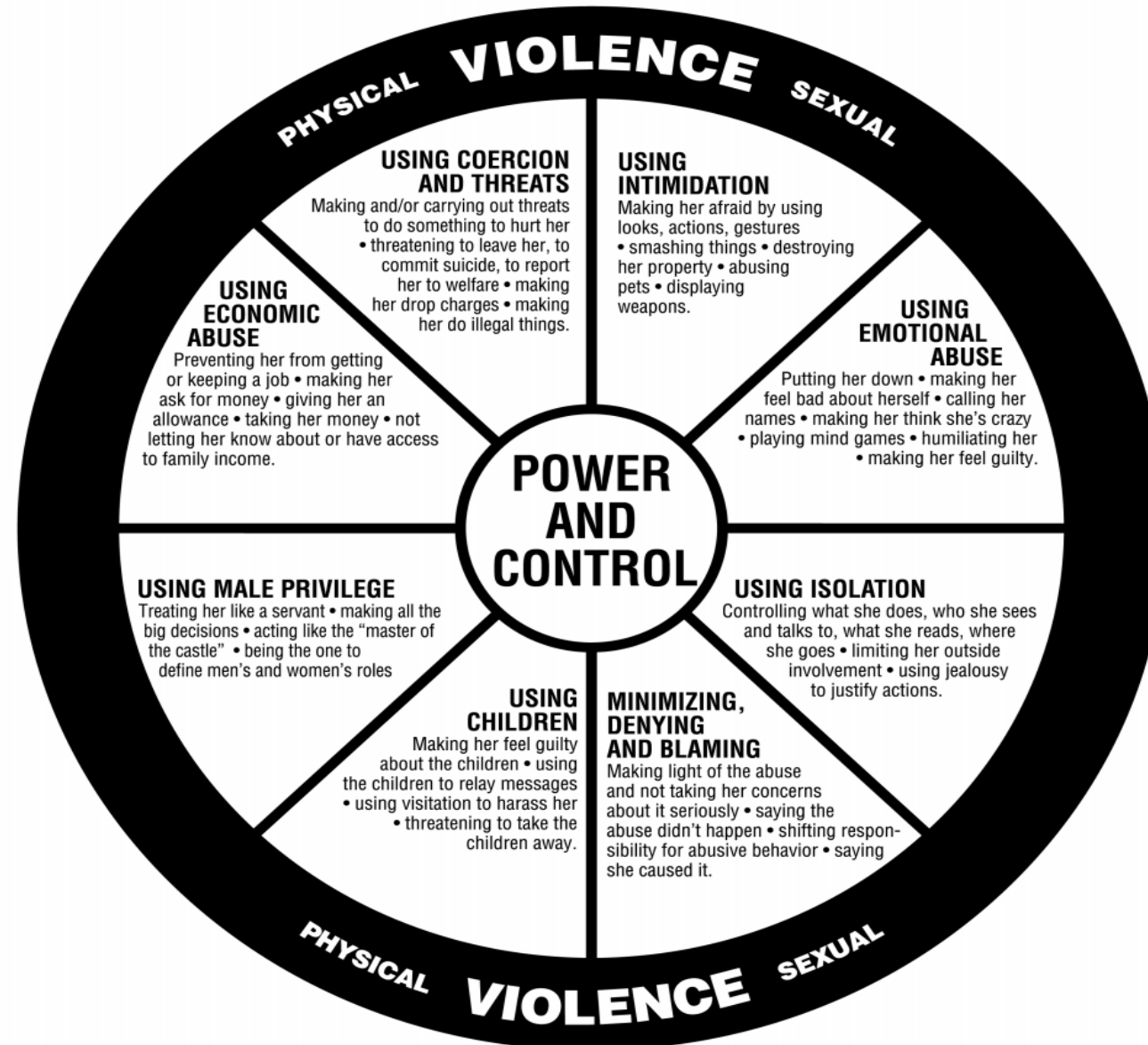
Sexual Assault

- **1 in 5 women** and **1 in 71 men** in the United States has been raped in their lifetime
- Almost half of female (**46.7%**) and male (**44.9%**) victims of rape in the United States were raped by an acquaintance
 - Of these, **45.4%** of female rape victims and **29%** of male rape victims were raped by an intimate partner



47% of transgender people are **sexually assaulted** at some point in their lifetime

What Does Abuse Look Like?



Coercive Control

- A web of tactics designed to diminish a survivor's liberty, autonomy, and dignity– all about dominance
- Tactics include:
 - intimidation,
 - surveillance,
 - degradation,
 - shaming
 - isolation
- Associated with high levels of separation violence
- Not illegal but can be very dangerous



IPV and HIV

- People experiencing abuse are more likely to acquire HIV.
- Why?
 - Abusive partner's status may not be disclosed
 - Harder to negotiate sex and condom usage
 - May be forced/coerced/encouraged to engage in high risk sex work or drug use
 - May turn to high-risk survival sex work for money
 - May use high-risk drugs to self-medicate

IPV and HIV

- Data indicates that 55% of women and 20% of men living with HIV experience IPV. What might this look like?
- In addition to more “typical” tactics of abuse, I’ve seen the following behaviors used against survivors living with HIV:
 - Not allowed to seek medical care
 - Medication tampered with, thrown out, or taken by abusive partner
 - Survivor’s serostatus disclosed to employer, family, friends
 - Emotional/psychological abuse targeting the survivor’s serostatus (shaming, blaming, name-calling, etc. – very common: “no one will love you”), often aimed at preventing them from leaving relationship
 - Physical violence—sometimes severe-- upon disclosure

IPV and HIV: Testing

- May be prohibited from testing/treatment
- May be afraid of current or former abusive partners being notified and retaliating
- May worry about what a positive test would mean in terms of legal issues
 - May not be aware of the 2021 criminalization overhaul in NV

IPV and HIV: Negative Health Outcomes

- May be harder to seek and maintain care
- May be harder to consistently comply with medication requirements
- Stress and abuse may make HIV medication less effective, resulting in higher viral load
- Physical violence
- Continued high-risk behaviors

IPV and HIV: Ending the Relationship

- May rely on abusive partner for: money, transportation, housing, access to and help with medical care, childcare, support, etc.
- May have been convinced by abusive partner that survivor does not deserve better
- May fear retaliation, including serostatus disclosure

Legal Options for Survivors in Nevada

Protection Orders


- Protection from Abuse Order
- Protection from Stalking/Harassment & Sexual Assault

Other Remedies

- Immigration (VAWA, U-Visa.)
- Divorce/Paternity
- Housing Protections—breaking leases

DV Protection Orders: relationship + crime

- Temporary orders last up to 45 days
- Extended orders can last up to two years (more often ordered for a year or less)
- Can order the abusive party to stay away from and have no contact with the survivor and other 3rd parties/locations
- Can make determinations about temporary child custody and visitation (likely won't include child support)
- Can order temporary financial arrangements (paying rent or mortgage, child support, etc.)
- Prevents abusive partner from acquiring firearms and can order them to relinquish the firearms they already have while order is in effect

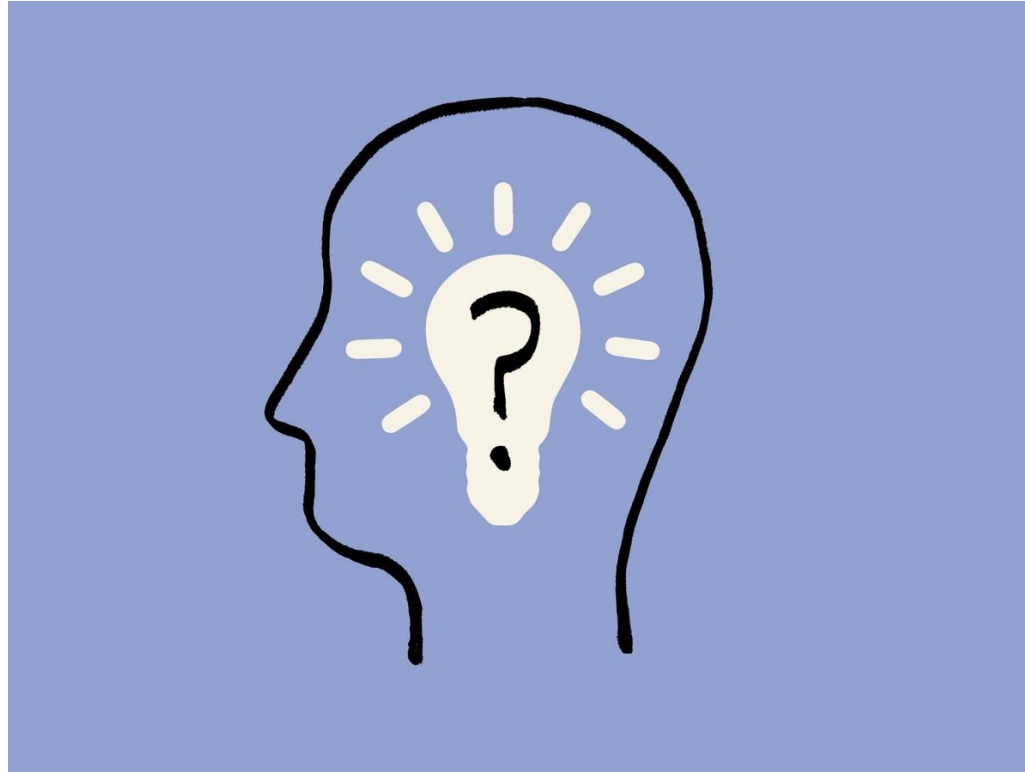
Boyd Law's Survivor Representation & Advocacy Clinic
