## **Mandatory Rapid Syphilis Screening in Pregnant Persons**

## SITUATIONAL AWARENESS SUMMARY

**Situation**: On July 25, 2025, the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health (NV DPBH) released a technical bulletin announcing <u>updates to NRS 442.010</u>, <u>regarding Rapid Point of Care Syphilis Testing During Pregnancy</u>. These amendments take effect on January 1, 2026; however, agencies are encouraged to begin implementation now.

- In 2023, Nevada ranked 6<sup>th</sup> in reported cases of congenital syphilis and 10<sup>th</sup> in primary and secondary syphilis.
- The majority of syphilis cases in Nevada syphilis occurred in Clark County in 2023: 76.4% of primary and secondary syphilis, 90.7% of early latent syphilis, and 71.4% of congenital syphilis cases.

## Congenital syphilis is preventable with timely screening and treatment during pregnancy.

- 1) All healthcare providers including physicians, advanced practice registered nurses, and physician assistants are required to screen for syphilis in pregnant persons:
  - a) At the first prenatal visit, AND
  - b) During the third trimester (between the 27<sup>th</sup> and 36<sup>th</sup> week), **AND**
  - c) At time of delivery, including stillbirths.
  - d) Amendments under AB360 additionally require:
    - i) All persons of childbearing age must be screened by a healthcare provider for pregnancy status, and if pregnant, tested for syphilis.
    - ii) Hospitals with an emergency department or labor and delivery unit, as well as certain non-hospital medical facilities, must be able to provide syphilis test results to pregnant persons without a history of prior infection before discharge.
    - iii) If testing is declined, this refusal must be documented in the patient's medical record.
- 2) CDC recommended treatment for syphilis in pregnant persons is benzathine penicillin G (Bicillin L-A®)
  - a) For patients with a penicillin allergy, penicillin desensitization should be performed prior to treatment.
  - b) Alternative formulations such as penicillin G sodium, penicillin G potassium, or Bicillin® C-R are not appropriate substitutes for syphilis treatment.
