FOCUS ON: Cyclosporiasis

Cyclosporiasis has evolved into a recurring, seasonal U.S. public health problem that demands renewed clinical attention. **As of August 25, 2026, the Centers for Disease Control and Surveillance (CDC) has received 17,180 reports of laboratory-confirmed cases of cyclosporiasis acquired in the U.S. since May 1, 2026. For comparison, 1,180 cases were reported between May 1 and August 31, 2025.** (1) The majority of this surge in cases are associated with an active outbreak investigation that has been linked to contaminated iceberg lettuce. (2) As of September 1, 2026, local case counts have not reflected this surge; only 3 locally confirmed cases associated with the outbreak have been identified, all with out-of-state exposures. The associated iceberg lettuce was not distributed in Clark County.

Cyclosporiasis exhibits predictable seasonality with approximately 90% of cases reported in the spring and summer (May to August). **As we enter September, it is important to note that cases from late-summer exposure can present with symptoms in early fall as incubation periods are from 2 days to 2 weeks or more.**

Cyclosporiasis is a gastrointestinal infection caused by the cyst form of the parasite, *Cyclospora cayetanensis*. Infected individuals shed oocysts, and sporulation into infectious cysts takes days to weeks in the environment. Thus, the mode of transmission is food or waterborne rather than from direct person-to-person transmission.

What can you do?

CONSIDER cyclosporiasis in patients who present with:

- Watery diarrhea, with frequent, sometimes explosive stool
- Other common symptoms:
 - Loss of appetite and weight
 - Cramping, bloating, and/or increased flatus
 - Nausea (vomiting is less common)
 - Prolonged fatigue
 - Low-grade fever, body aches and other flu-like symptoms

*If untreated, the illness may last for a few days to a month or longer and may have a remitting-relapsing course.

TEST SPECIFICALLY for *Cyclospora* via:

- A GI multiplex PCR stool panel that includes *Cyclospora*.
- Specific staining and microscopy methods to detect *Cyclospora* (routine ova and parasite testing do not reliably detect *Cyclospora*). (3)

TREAT confirmed cases of cyclosporiasis with 7-10 days of trimethoprim-sulfamethoxazole (TMP-SMX) with longer courses for persons with immunocompromising conditions.

REPORT suspected cases to SNHD Disease Surveillance and Control, do not wait for laboratory confirmation.

Nevada Regulatory Updates on Notifiable Conditions

The Nevada Legislative Commission approved amendments to Nevada Administrative Code (NAC) 441A on December 10, 2023.

These amendments expanded the definition of “communicable disease” to include any condition identified by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) as a nationally notifiable condition, along with several other specific diseases. Cyclosporiasis is one of the new conditions added to the list.
